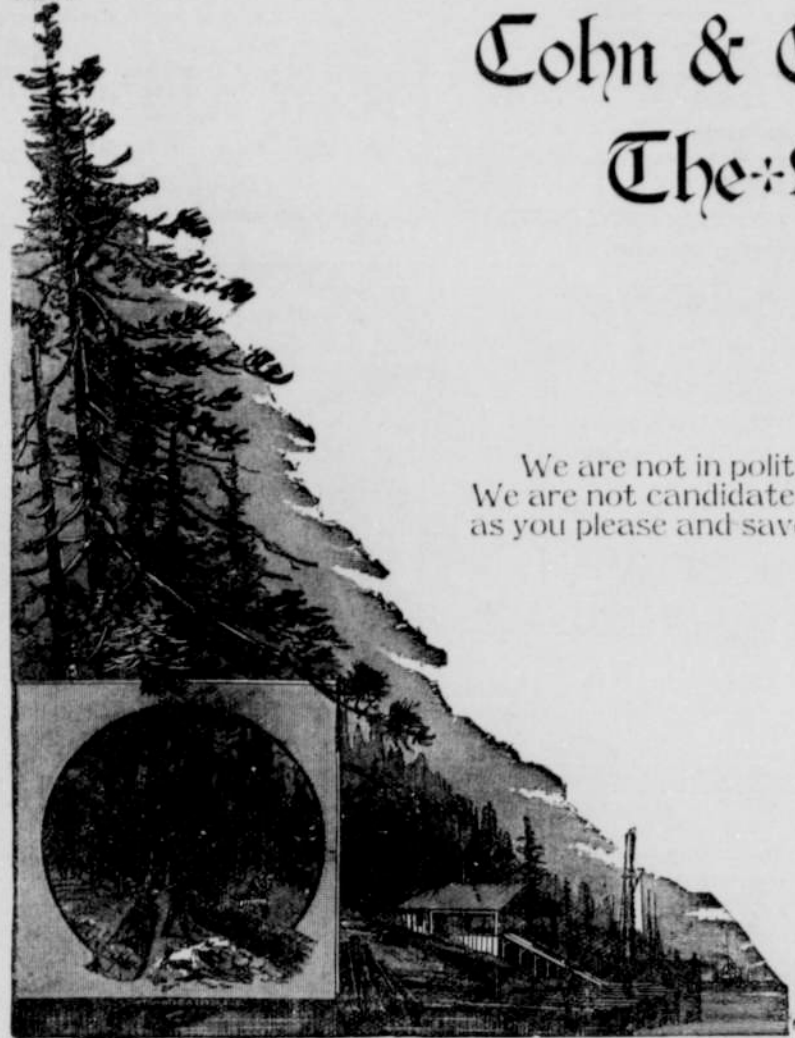

county committee. A meeting of the committeemen and candidates was held Saturday night to discuss the methods of the coming campaign. Among other things it was decided to hold a few public meetings in the month of May.

THE VOTE.

For Joint Senator the vote stood as follows: Smith 47, scattering 20.

For Joint Representative—Brooks 35, Severance 27, scattering 5. Second ballot—Brooks 41, Severance 27.

For delegates to state convention—Smith 49, Brooks 32, Arstall 26, Lamb 17, Hambley 31, Maxwell 11, only 3 to be elected. On motion Smith, Brooks and Hambley were chosen.

For Commissioner—Wheeler 50, Parish 11, on informal ballot, and made unanimous on motion of Parish.

For Clerk—Informal ballot, White 37, Alderman 26, McNair 5. Second ballot White 38, Alderman 29, scattering 1.

For Sheriff—Informal ballot, Jackson 38, Linville 23, scattering 7. Second ballot, Jackson 44, Linville 23, blank 1.

For Treasurer—Informal ballot, Sturgeon 16, Barker 47, scattering 4. Second ballot about the same.

For Assessor—Mizner 12, Stephens 47, scattering 8.

For Surveyor—Austin 40, Dunstan 23, scattering 5.

School Supt.—Informal ballot, Kiger 20, Vincent 32, scattering 14. Second ballot, Vincent 32, Kiger 29, Geo. Hambley 6. Third ballot, Kiger 16, Vincent 31, scattering 1.

For Coroner—The nomination of Reynolds was practically unanimous.

In the 2nd district there was quite a contest for J. P. between Reynolds and Sappington, and while Sappington was behind at first he suddenly gained and got the nomination. There was also a spirited contest for constable in the same precinct, Gil Stillwell and Hoag being Anderson's closest competitors. In the other precincts there was no fight over the minor offices.

LOCAL NEWS

We Ask But Justice.

The republican party of this county again made a nomination for joint representative for Tillamook and Yamhill counties, and we again want to call the attention of our party friends of Yamhill county, to the fact that for four years we have been unrepresented in the lower house of the legislature. By the state census of 1895 Yamhill county had 4033 legal voters to Tillamook's 1118; and as Yamhill has two representatives in addition to the joint representative, we ask our party friends of Yamhill to give us the nomination this year and not deprive us of the same, as has been done for the past four years.

The Salmon Industry.

That salmon return to the hatchery or stream from whence they start is a fact so well established that no one doubts it and that salmon is the best food fish there is, a staple in the market of the world commanding coin, are also facts. It follows that everyone who propagates salmon owns them, that they'll return to him after passing out to sea, where he grows and matures without any expense or care to the owner. The man who propagates him is absolutely the owner of the young fry and the returned grown fish as he is of his cattle and hogs on the range. They come home, and furnish him a stable commodity, commanding money certainly as does cotton in the South, hogs or hominy in the Mississippi valley. The farm with its attendant care, truck, and turnover, goes on just the same, and in the harvest you have a more assured crop, commanding money. These then being admitted truths, all that remains is to remove the glamour and mystery from the hatchery and everybody engage in it for it is as simple and easy as setting a hen, and raising chickens. The appliances consist of a box, sluice box, or trough, 12 or 16 feet long, and 4 feet deep, with a stream of water the size of a pond. Put in gravel, 1 inch deep, then the spawn and eggs spread over the gravel, (obtained from the female salmon), then over this the male spawn. This is best distributed by a milking process or squeezing the fish and expressing the spawn or milk from the recently caught fish. Yet, the eggs, having a vitality and life of themselves, can be fertilized and transported long distances in damp moss without impairing their value and then hatched. So it is sure that a salmon hatchery can be started on a "six bit" capital, and the owner of it is absolute owner of his output which surely returns to him from beginning to finish without cost and then commands ready money and plenty of it, and it is an industry in which everybody is interested and in which everybody can engage. Reciprocity is written in every line. The farmer, fisherman, canneryman are all co-operators for the general good through avenue second only to the lumber industry on all this Pacific Coast. The success and development of the salmon industry interests everybody on the coast and he who causes a thousand fish to float where there was one is a public benefactor. There are many eggs incubated under the canneries and were they not exposed to gulls, big fish and other enemies there would be great numbers hatched every season, from which fact one would naturally conclude that at a salmon cannery with its spawn water etc. would be a desirable place for a hatchery in which the county might invest and promote for the public good.

No Fusion.

Mr. Fulton is an old soldier, is badly crippled and gets a pension of \$30 per month. He made the trip on foot however, and was greatly pleased to get out of the wilderness into this beautiful valley. He has land on both sides of the line between this and Washington, and from what he says, the tax rate in this county is not more than one-sixth what it is here.

Jack Perry, the old stage driver, had another stroke of apoplexy Thursday night, and remained unconscious until his death Friday morning. He was buried by the Odd Fellows Sunday. He seemed to have some warning of his death, as he had just recently written in his memorandum book directions to his friends as to how his few effects should be disposed of, and suggestions as to his burial. He was found Thursday evening lying unconscious at his stable where he lived. He has no relatives here, though W. E. H. Cary and Sheriff Jackson knew him as a stage driver in early days in Nevada and California. He was born in 1822 and was married to Miss E. J. Stone in 1860. His wife died a little over a year ago. Two children were born to them, both of which are dead, the son being killed in a railroad accident in Eureka county, Nevada, in 1874. According to the desires of the deceased his effects are left with C. P. Knudson, who has charge of the small estate—a little personal property.
