

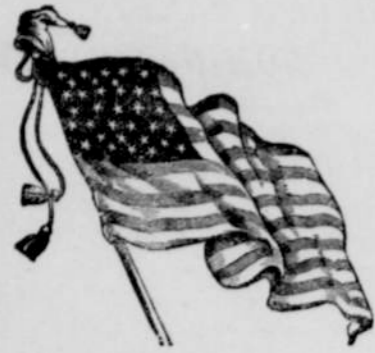

The experiment has been tried, and found to be a failure. One dollar per year will not pay for the white paper used in a weekly newspaper. Any sheet which offers itself at that rate is surely not worth any more and surely does not expect to remain in business long. The HEADLIGHT tried it once temporarily, but found it a losing game. This paper expects to remain a permanent fixture, paying its bills, and will not attempt to compete in price with a cheap concern where no money is invested, no experience used, and which is frequently in the hands of the sheriff for failure to pay its bills. Even a patent side paper with a small news service can't stand the \$1.00 rate long. Why it couldn't live on \$1.50 per year. A legitimate newspaper with \$3000 invested in it, experienced labor employed, all home print, and chuck full of news, can't stand any \$1.00 rate, and is getting a dozen \$1.50 subscriptions where the \$1.00 concern is getting one at its Chinaman price. The big city papers make enormous sums on their advertising. This is why they have such cheap rates. They can afford to give subscriptions away, and several offer to do it.

The cannerymen have formed a combination, including all the packers on the river with the exception of Wm. Hume and the Scandinavian Packing Co. They have placed the price of Chinook salmon at 4 cents per pound, bluebacks at 2½ cents and steelheads at 2 cents. The cannerymen claim they are unable to pay more for their fish except at a direct loss. The fishermen on the other hand feel as if they have been badly treated by the cannerymen who gave out enormous quantities of twine, and the supposition was all along that 5 cents was to be paid. Some of the leading seiners met in Astoria on Wednesday and decided that if the strike should last till May, they would can their own fish. By uniting the upper and lower river canneries it will enable the combine to pack fish, should there be a strike of any duration, in great quantities at mere nominal cost, and place them in a position to fill their orders independent of the supply from the raps, seines or gill nets. The prospects for a long and serious strike look imminent.—Cathlamet Gazette.
