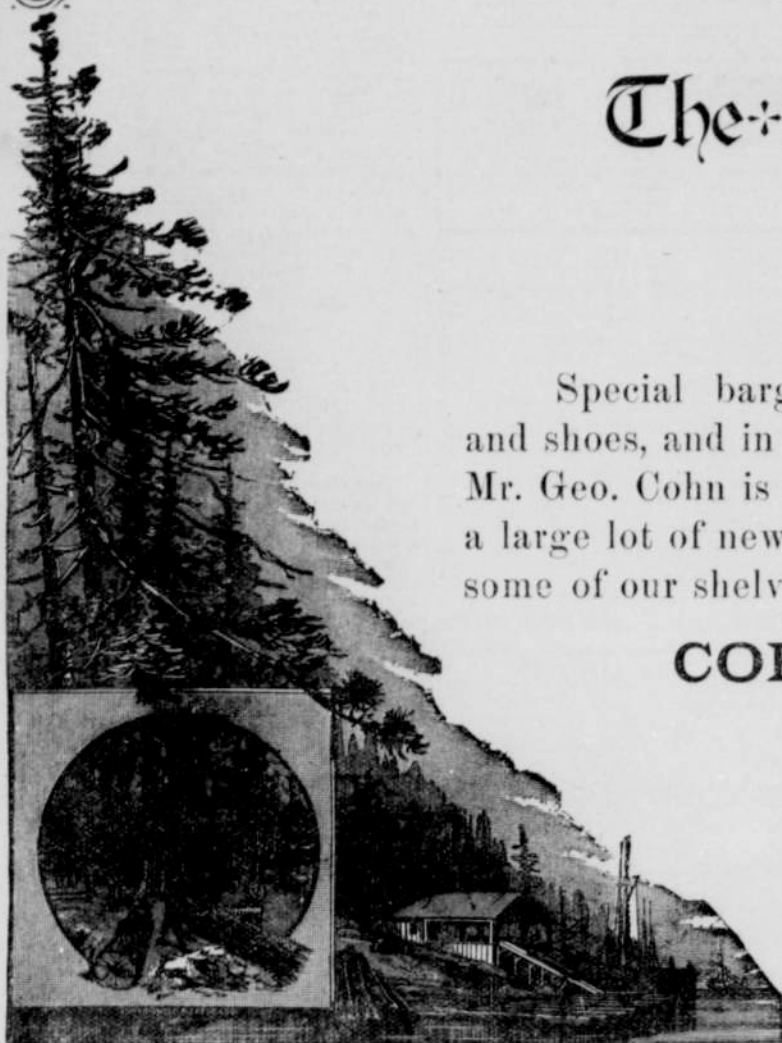

The new wharf for the Tillamook Lumber Co., is assuming immense proportions, and will give ample room for handling freight, for a lumber yard, and will have large lumber sheds.
There should be prompt action regarding drainage in the central portion of town. The matter has been delayed too long already. The filthy swamp is a menace to health and should be filled or drained at once.
E. G. E. Wist is building a substantial, well-fitted cannery at Nehalem. It will be covered with corrugated iron and will be fitted with good machinery. He will can salmon and clams, making a specialty of the latter.
Lester P. Smith and W. L. Brooks, our candidates for joint senator and representative respectively, have gone to Portland to attend the republican state convention. T. B. Hancley the other delegate was unable to go and Mr. Brooks holds his proxy.
The State census shows that Tillamook was in 1895 fifth in the list of butter production with 312,324 pounds while in 1885 she was sixteenth in the list with only 90,983 pounds. The census report for this county however does not represent more than half the actual production of butter and cheese here, which

would place Tillamook first now. Some of the counties which rank along with Tillamook are much larger counties and have been settled for a long time.
Tillamook has \$17,000, Nesucca river \$6,000, and nothing for Nehalem are the figures reported in the Oregonian. This is the decision of the committee, and will no doubt be ratified by the house, besides Mr. Hermann thinks the Senate committee will largely increase these figures.
While in Portland Geo. Cohn will purchase a large stock of new goods, regardless of whether he gets the nomination for joint representative. If Mr. Cohn should also get the nomination, he promises to improve the bar at North Yamhill and have the state house moved to Tillamook.
Geo. Cohn and Theo. Steinhilber, delegates to the democratic convention have gone to Portland. Judge Conder was a delegate also, but could not go, and Mr. Cohn holds his proxy. Dr. W. J. May who was recommended for joint senator accompanied them. Mr. Cohn is the recommendee for joint representative.
What a waste of time, energy and money it was for that democratic delegation to brave the hardships of a rough, muddy mountain road in the cold rain, when we come to think that their noble efforts are all futile. In fact the populist and democratic conventions here last week were labor for the pains—like trying to garner chaff in a whirlwind.
The people north of town have a good walk to the city limits. The city should cause the walk to be built to the bridge at once, and at the expense of J. A. Monroe, whose property would face the walk. The streets were graveled in front of his property without expense to him, and he should pay for the walk, as it is expensive, the bill for lumber being only \$10, and the work being donated.
Joe Bixby has moved his stock of clothing, boots and shoes to Charley Reynolds' hardware store where they will be sold out for less than cost. Mr. Bixby intends to return to Nestucca, and if you want some bargains, call before the goods are gone. J. H. Hecker, the creameryman, and his wife had trouble lately, and in the absence of Mr. Hecker, his wife took the household goods away. He then procured the goods and brought them back. They had a trial for rights of property Tuesday before Judge Mansley and a jury, and the goods were awarded to Mr. Hecker. It seems to be a case of incompatibility, much to be regretted by the friends of both parties, and the details of the trial are not proper for publication. In fact few would be interested in hearing the accusations and counter-accusations. T. B. Hancley was attorney for Mrs. Hecker and E. E. Selph was attorney for Mr. Hecker. Further litigation is talked of, however it is possible that the trouble may be settled amicably yet.

The couple recently came from Wisconsin. Mr. Hecker being an expert creameryman, was engaged before he came here to take charge of the Tillamook creamery. A young man named Sorensen, who came out with them, figures quite conspicuously in the case.
Ranchers or creamerymen who have products which they wish to sell in Astoria should see Jim Fox, of the steamer Elmore. Jim takes great pride in displaying and introducing Tillamook products in Astoria, and charges nothing for his services. Some of our butter, cheese, veal, etc., now find a ready market in Astoria at good prices—better than in Portland, and that city can use a large part of the productions of this county, excepting lumber of course, as the Clatsop county farmers are yet unable or lacking in energy to supply the Astoria market with butter, cheese, eggs, beef, pork and vegetables.
Prof. Lloyd, of Forest Grove, has just returned from a trip to Tillamook, where he had gone to study the rock oyster. He had thought before he went that the mollusk bored a hole in the solid rock, to be turned into his home, by means of his shell, to which a grinding motion was given by the muscles of the oyster inside. After his study of this week, he has changed his theory. He finds that the oyster bores the chamber into the rock with his foot, and when the hole is large enough the foot drops off or is absorbed. Our coast visitors this summer being in possession of Prof. Lloyd's hint, can make study for themselves.—Hillsboro Independent.
The Portland republicans had a regular Kilkenny-cat time at their convention last Saturday. The Simon and Frank factions were about equally divided and fought for possession of the convention. There were many black eyes, peeled noses and crushed hats. The convention split up, and two tickets is the result. It is simply a case of two bosses trying to get control, and is a disgrace to the city and state. It will help poor old cranky Penoyer to get the office of mayor, and he will clean out the whole lot of things, though the new lot he puts in may turn out as bad in the long run. Portland republicans (?) are giving Oregon a pretty reputation!
The steamer Elmore arrived in the bay Wednesday at 6:30 p. m., after being detained in Astoria three days bar bound. It was just such luck as occurs once in a while to steamboats. A nipple which connects the bottom blow-off cork to the boiler gave out, and the Engineer reported to the Captain that it would be necessary to stop the vessel to make repairs, so she was headed off shore, boiler emptied, repaired, and headed on her course, and came in all O. K. to the entire satisfaction of the passengers. When she passed Tillamook rock light house, she signaled the light keeper that everything was all right so they would telephone to Astoria, and that would doubtless allay any uneasiness that might have occurred to shippers, owners or people who had friends on board.

Some unimportant ordinances, and an ordinance regulating time minors may loiter on street read the first time. The following ordinance was passed:
The following Ordinance was passed:
CITY ORDINANCES.
AN ORDINANCE TO PREVENT CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.
The people of Tillamook city do ordain as follows:
Section 1. No person shall within the corporate limits of Tillamook city, tie, fasten or leave standing upon any street, alley, or any other place whatsoever any animal whether belonging to himself or another during stormy or inclement weather for a longer period than one and one-half hour; but that before the expiration of one and one-half hour such person shall put such animal in a barn, shed or other building affording sufficient shelter therefor.
Section 2. No person shall within the corporate limits of Tillamook city beat or torture any animal whether belonging to himself or another.
Section 3. No person shall within the corporate limits of Tillamook city overdrive or overload or drive when overloaded, or overwork, torture, or deprive of the necessary sustenance, or cruelly beat or mutilate, or cruelly kill, or cause or procure to be so overdriven, or overloaded, or driven when overloaded, or overworked, tortured, tormented, deprived of the necessary sustenance, cruelly beaten, mutilated, or cruelly killed any animal either as owner or otherwise.
Section 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance upon conviction thereof before the Recorder, shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than ten dollars and cost, and shall be imprisoned in the city jail until such fine and costs are paid, provided that such person so convicted shall be confined in the city jail one day for every two dollars of such fine and cost.

Notice is hereby given that the common council of Tillamook city, Oregon has ordered the sidewalk to be constructed in accordance with resolution adopted by the common council on the 16th day of March, 1896.
Said sidewalk to begin at the south line of Fourth Street at its intersection with the line of Stillwell Avenue, thence east on the south line of Fourth Street to intersect the sidewalk already built on the north line of the public school property, and to be constructed in accordance with the city ordinance providing the construction of sidewalks, and that the property abutting thereon and adjacent thereto, and to be completed within a reasonable time, and under the supervision of the street commissioner, owners, or any of them, of property abutting thereon or adjacent thereto, shall fail to construct said sidewalk within the said 30 days, the common council will then proceed to construct said sidewalk and assess upon the lot or lots thereof, the cost thereof of such construction.
