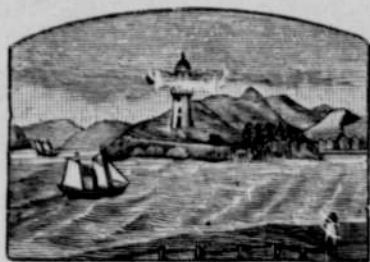

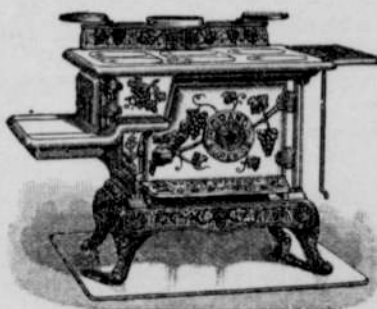

SOME UNITED STATES LAWS

TIMELY WARNING BY THE
U. S. ENGINEERS.

The Following letter is self explanatory:

OFFICE OF

Portland, Ore., April 3, 1896.

W. F. D. Jones Esq.,
Editor Tillamook Headlight,
Tillamook, Oregon.

My Dear Sir:
Word has been received at this office
to the effect that the dikes in Tillamook
bay have become the repository for
numerous tree tops, snags, etc., and
that the most of this debris is newly cut
and has been thrown into the rivers
tributary to Tillamook bay, by loggers
or ranchers at work along the river
banks.

There is a strict law forbidding the
placing of trees, brush, etc., in naviga-
ble streams or along the banks of
streams where they may, by freshets, be
washed into navigable waters. The jus-
tice of this law is obvious. The govern-
ment is annually expending money for
the purpose of removing shoals and gen-
erally improving navigation by means
of dike construction, and these small
trees, etc., are in some cases the pri-
mary cause of many shoals as well as a
source of menace to steamers, and are
destructive to the existing dikes.

Whether the law is violated willfully
or ignorantly, it is the purpose of the
United States to rigidly enforce the
same, and I believe the publication of
the law mentioned would be information
worthy of perusal by some of your
readers.

If you will call the attention of the
good people of Tillamook county to the
substance of the extract enclosed,
through the columns of the enterprising
and newsy HEADLIGHT, I will consider it
a personal favor.

I expect to make a trip to Tillamook
bay this spring for the purpose of mak-
ing an examination of the work done by
our last dike construction, and will call
upon you at that time.

EXTRACT FROM RIVER AND HARBOR ACT
APPROVED SEPTEMBER 19, 1890.

Sec. 6. "That it shall not be lawful to
cast, throw, empty, or unload, or cause,
suffer, or procure to be cast, thrown,
emptied, or unloaded, either from or out
of any ship, vessel, lighter, barge, boat,
or other craft, or from the shore, pier,
wharf, furnace, manufacturing estab-
lishments, or mills of any kind what-
ever, any ballast, stone, slate, gravel,
earth, rubbish, wreck, filth, slabs, edg-
ings, sawdust, slag, cinders, ashes, re-
fuse, or other waste of any kind into
any port, road, roadstead, harbor, haven
navigable river, or navigable waters of
the United States which shall tend to
impede or obstruct navigation, or to de-
posit or place or cause, suffer, or procure
to be deposited or placed, any ballast,
stone, slate, gravel, earth, rubbish,
wreck, filth, slabs, edgings, sawdust, or
other waste, in any place or situation on
the bank of any navigable waters where
the same shall be liable to be washed
into such navigable waters, either by or-
dinary or high tides, or by storms or
floods, or otherwise, whereby navigation
shall or may be impeded or obstructed.

Sec. 10. " * * * Every person
and every corporation which shall be
guilty of creating or continuing any
such unlawful obstruction in this act
mentioned, or who shall violate the pro-
visions of the last four preceding sec-
tions of this act, shall be deemed guilty
of a misdemeanor, and on conviction
thereof shall be punished by a fine not
exceeding five thousand dollars, or by
imprisonment not exceeding one year,
or by both such punishments, in the dis-
cretion of the court.

Sec. 11. That it shall be the duty of
officers and agents having the supervi-
sion on the part of the United States, of
the works in progress for the preserva-
tion and improvement of said navigable
waters, and, in their absence, of the
United States collectors of customs and
other revenue officers to enforce the pro-
visions of this act by giving information
to the district attorney of the United
States for the district in which any vi-
olation of any provision of this act shall
have been committed."

From Mexico.

The following letter was recently re-
ceived from M. K. Handy, formerly of
Nehalem, who is now on the isthmus
of Tehuantepec, Mexico:

Minatitlan, State of Vera Cruz,
March 24, 1896.

Ed. HEADLIGHT:—After a pleasant
journey, we arrived at that quaint old
city of Mexico. In passing out of the
valley we noticed the natives plowing,
seeding and harvesting, all within a ra-
dius of a few miles. At Orizaba we saw
the first coffee, and the trees were bend-
ing under their load of fruit.

We stopped in Vera Cruz two days
waiting for a boat. It is a filthy city,
and we amused ourselves watching the
buzzards fighting for the offal. The
beach here is fine and abounds in cur-
ious and pretty shells. The voyage
from Vera Cruz to Minatitlan was pleas-
ant, mostly in the day time. We saw
thousands of porpoises.

Minatitlan is situated on the bank of
the river Coatzacoalcas, about 25 miles
from the gulf of Mexico. The river is
very deep, and the largest ships can
come in, and anywhere can swing up to
the bank, put out a plank, and put
freight or passengers ashore. There
are two ships here now, one an Ameri-
can after motogany logs and a Mexican
trader.

It is real summer, with trees, vines,
fruit and flowers flourishing luxuriantly
everywhere. The hottest day was 93,
and the coldest 65 degrees, and we have
a refreshing shower every three or four
days. My throat trouble has disap-
peared.

I go to the market every morning and
get fresh fish, fruit, vegetables and
game—there being a great variety of
each.

Have just been up the river as far as
we could go in a steam launch, and am
better pleased than ever with the coun-
try.

However, I will name some of the dis-
advantages: Noxious insects, such as
mosquitoes and pinolens, at certain sea-
sons, but not bad; lack of good titles to
lands, and the methods of taxation.

There are no plows or wagons here.
They plant with sharp sticks, do no cul-
tivating, and carry their products to
market on their heads or on pack horses.

Here are names of some of the fruits:
Mangoes, alligator pears, zapotes, cus-
tard apples, nameys, nanchese, rose ap-
ples, pine apples, guavos, melacatong,
Yucca rice, tamarinda, etc.

This is a great place for flowers, and
roses tulips, etc., grow to perfection.
Mistletoe and other curious plants are
plentiful.

There are thousands of parrots and
other queer birds.

There are no sidewalks on the streets
of this town, and the people walk in the
middle of the street almost naked.
There are a few thousand people in the
city, but no doctor, no dentist, no jew-
eler, and no newspaper.

Give my regards to the boys.

The committee reported adversely
upon the bill for a station at Tillamook,
upon the recommendation of the super-
intendent, who says that there are
other points where stations should be
established before Tillamook is consid-
ered. They report in favor of Rogue
river entrance, a place which has about
as much commerce as Nestucca, how-
ever.

The Telephone-Register imparts the
following bit of news, all of which we
are glad to hear: "Miss Lou Lynch left
Wednesday morning for Beaver, Tilla-
mook county, where she will teach
school. Miss Lynch is a graduate of
McMinnville college and is eminently
fitted by education and temperament to
not only instruct her pupils but to be a
factor in the social life of the community.

Regarding the gold mines near Mc-
Minnville, the Telephone-Register says:
"On Monday last the first work of devel-
opment on the Semmens lode was start-
ed. A cook and bunk house 12x20 is
being erected. As soon as completed
and all the necessities for mining opera-
tions can be gathered together, the work
of putting in a tunnel will com-
mence. It is contemplated to work day
and night shifts of three men each, and
within two months it is expected the
work will prove whether the discovery
is valuable or not. No one is sanguine
over the matter and if it proves value-
less no one will be disappointed—neither
will the interested parties be broke."

THE STATE CONVENTIONS

GREAT EXCITEMENT IN
PORTLAND.

The state conventions are over and
the tickets are before the people.

The republicans nominated R. S.
Bean for supreme judge. J. A. Carson,
of Salem, is our candidate for district
attorney. G. W. Patterson, of Hillsboro
received the nomination for joint sena-
tor, and W. L. Brooks, of this county
was the choice for joint representative.

T. H. Tongue received the congressional
nomination in this, the 1st district, and
W. R. Ellis was re-nominated in the
second district. Sol. Hirsch was chosen
chairman of the state central commit-
tee. The convention made no expres-
sion on the financial question except to
endorse the bi-metallic platform of 1892.
The anti-silver resolution was promptly
voted down, much to the chagrin of the
Oregonian-Simon-Dolph-Sears-deputy-
sheriff-crowd. The platform declares
for protection, and the delegates to the
national convention are instructed for
McKinley. There is pretty general satis-
faction at the result of the convention.

The democrats nominated John Bar-
nett, of Linn, for supreme judge; S. L.
Hayden for district attorney; W. B.
Dillard, of Columbia, for joint senator;
and Geo. Cohn, of Tillamook for rep-
resentative. For Congress: 1st district,
Jeff Meyers; 2nd district, A. S. Bennett.
G. O. Nolan was chosen member of the
state central committee for Tillamook.
A free silver platform was adopted by
an overwhelming majority, much to the
disgust of a small minority.
