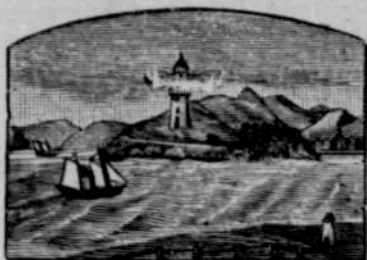

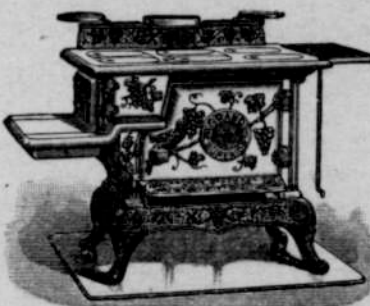

Note the semi-annual statement of the
county officials printed on another page
of this issue. From the summary it ap-
pears the county is in debt in all \$43,000
and the total resources are \$37,000, not
a very great difference, except the taxes
due this year, and a lot of delinquent
taxes are counted as resources. Much
of the delinquent taxes will never be
collected, and while we are collecting
this year's taxes the county expenses
will be going on. However, the county
is in better shape now than for a long
time, and the price of warrants will keep
on rising.

The Wilson river road will soon be
traveled again and there is talk of a
stage line being put on. Except for the
bridges T. C. McNamer put in last fall,
the road has not been improved to speak
of. In some places it is overgrown with
brush so as to be disagreeable to the
traveler, which needs cutting out. Cul-
verts and small bridges will need re-
placing soon to be safe. The Tillamook
owners of the road have not seemed dis-
posed to do anything to improve their
property, probably feeling that they
have already enough money in it. It
would be better for the road if those
having claims against it would relin-
quish them and give the road to the
county, and it is probably as much as
the lien holders will ever get out of it.—
Forest Grove Times.

TALK ABOUT THE ACADEMY

ANOTHER VERSION OF THE AFFAIR.

Ed. HEADLIGHT:—There are two sides
to everything. Every virtue is opposed
to a vice, and every poison has its anti-
dote. In case of a deadly poison, an
effective dose of antidote is needed.
Sugar and candy will do no good. A
crime must be punished to give satisfac-
tion to the offended party and to correct
the offender. The correction, according
to justice, should be according to the
nature of the crime.

A more lie, that might be called a
"lapis lingue" will be punished by a
corporal punishment in the academy.
It depends with what the lie is connect-
ed. The mere stealing of a rope is not
punished by penitentiary, but if the
rope is connected with a horse or a cow
it might be worth a trip to Salem. If a
lie is connected with immorality, it de-
serves a corporal punishment, even in
case of dismissing the offender from the
institution. The corporal punishment
is an antidote, and has nothing to do
with the ladies or gentlemen, and there-
fore it is not called anti-lady or anti-
gentlemen, but simply antipoison to
destroy the poison contained in the
ladies and gentlemen.

Pride and indulgence of the senses of
the body of our first parents was the
cause of concupiscence. They wanted
to be like God and wanted to satisfy
their bodily taste with a fine apple.
Pride and the voluptuousness of the body
were the poison and the cause of this
pernicious effect, which effect is best
cured by its antidote, humiliation and
chastisement of the body, being opposed
to pride and voluptuousness of the body.
Did you ever see the point before!

Corporal punishment contains in the
best and highest degree the antidote
which destroys the poison and immor-
ality; it contains humiliation and chas-
tisement of the body, absolutely requir-
ed to destroy that poison. Ignorance is
not cured by ignorance but by learning,
nor is immorality cured by keeping sil-
ence, or allowing it or in sending the
pupil away. "Is there any person in
Tillamook who dares to come to the
academy declaring himself wiser than
Solomon. Let this person come and we
will have him as a teacher. You par-
ents might say that this is not according
to American principles to correct pupils.
I tell you it is not nor will it lead to the
American conclusion which is the scaf-
fold, the electric chair, the home of the
fallen women, or the penitentiary as
your American principles will. Such
principles are not found in the academy.
You can see about twenty testimonials
of this kind every day in the Oregonian.
A few days ago the superintendent of
the "Open Door" a home for fallen
women in Portland gave the following
important statement:

"Not all have been bad girls, some
only needing protection and encourage-
ment. Some have been excellent busi-
ness girls. Some have been cultured
ladies; some fine musicians, some hand-
some and interesting. They have come
from all grades of life; but they have all
shown the lack of a mother's firm guid-
ance in the beginning of their lives."

This is an awful indictment of moth-
ers of sinning women; at the same time,
it ought to be a solemn and effective
warning to mothers not to shirk their
duty. Mothers often yield to their
daughters' importunities, out of a weak-
ness which they fancy is parental af-
fection. Would they give a rattle snake
to a child who might be pleased with
the snake's mottles? That, indeed,
would be a positive kindness compared
with allowing your girls to visit many
public halls unattended by their
mothers.

In spite of all the warnings that come
from ministers of every denomination
against the moral dangers of the ball
room, mothers not only allow their in-
nocent daughters to frequent them, but
not infrequently urge them to attend,
with a false desire to thus get "their
girls into society," and so marry them
off.

The Tillamook academy will not turn
out ladies and gentlemen are a dis-
grace to themselves, to their families
and to society; the rules and the guid-
ance have destroyed this pernicious poison
of society. The academy has to be a
model school in every line or will be
given up. We want all the parents
whose children are here, to know, un-
derstand and to be sure that as long as
their dearly beloved are in the academy,
they are taught, directed, protected,
