ROADS BEFORE BRIDGES.

ED. HEADLIGHT:—I see a paragraph in the HEADLIGHT which reads as follows:

"To get the vote of Nestucca, the candidate for commissioner must be in favor of bridging the Big Nestucca river."

I say no. If I understand the wants of the majority of the people of the south end of the county, there is something that we want, and would do the public more good than said bridge. It is a road. There are about three or four months in the year that we need a bridge badly, but there are twelve months in the year we need a road. Building said bridge is too much like building a set of bars and no fence. If we cannot get to the bridge, what is the bridge good for? Bridge building is expensive. I don't think that the county is able to pay \$2,000 or \$2,500 for a bridge. It is only a small portion of the year that a bridge is absolutely needed. Let's put our money in road building and as little bridge building as possible.

THE NEHALEM BEACH ROAD.

ED. HEADLIGHT:—Permit me to say a few words in regard to the North Necarnie and beach road. The route as laid out by the viewers does not touch short sand beach by one-half mile or more. Why the committee should publish the route as via short sand beach is a conundrum. They could not connect with the Armstrong trail without going two or three miles in an opposite direction. The viewers reported another route which was accepted, which does not touch short sand beach, False Tillamook or Cloutier beach by one mile or more, in fact it is not a beach road at all, but goes through heavy hemlock timber for four or five miles, hilly and

mountainous, and strikes daylight at Walsh's place.

No one lives between Wm. Snyder's near Nebalem, and Mr. Walsh's, some eight or nine miles distant, while the coast route has several families living between short sand beach and arch cape. A better and nearer road and also cheaper one can be made that way and the settlers would liberally contribute money and labor and help keep it in repair. Otherwise, they will not have anything to do with it. Already, some who have subscribed, thinking it was to be the coast route, have withdrawn their aid, and will not contribute if it is built through the back trail as it is too far from the beach, and civilization. For Congress.

There are only two sides the "twins" for a gold standard, high interest, scarcity of money and low price of products; and the people's party for free coinage of silver and gold, salaries of officers lower, plenty of money, low interest and high price for products. Take your choice on the 1st of June 1896. If you like to see money bring from 10 to 200 per cent. interest, vote the old party ticket, but if you want reform vote with the party that promises reform and will carry out its promise. The records of the people's party in the U. S. senate show that if the people's party leaders were strong enough we would have the free and unlimited coinage of silver at 16 to 1. The law would be passed in a day. The old parties have been having free coinage in their platforms (to catch votes) for the last 20 years, and now when the people want to force them to act, they declare for the English gold standard. It is important to vote for your own interest.

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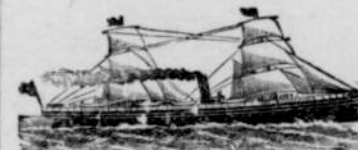
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
