[In France the arts and sciences are used as devices to promote and satiate lust and lechery; in Italy brigandage is deemed a necessary evil; at Monaco crime is licensed; Greeks have horrible and unmentionable crimes; Russia is undermined with assassins, anarchists and nihilists; Spain and Portugal are verging into barbarism again; the White Chapel district of London is reeking with pollution; many of the Hungarians live and act like beasts; and the unspeakable Turk, while not frolicking in his harem, amuses himself by butchering Armenian women and children. No, we resent the idea that America is worse for crime than Europe. Over half the inmates of our penitentiaries here are foreigners. Fallen women are not so plentiful here either. American freedom, American inspirations, and the lack of the lash or systems of espionage, are what develop noble American manhood and virtuous American womanhood. True, in some localities we need reform badly. We need it here, and as suggested in the above, parents should use better judgment, but the shalalah is an un-American remedy. It is doubtful if it is best for boys—never for young ladies—especially where there is a doubt as to their guilt. We take general exceptions to the imputations against American methods.]

There was a small boat found in the creek at Harrison Booth's place the other morning taken there during the night and it remains there yet. It was evidently taken over land at that place as the stream is not navigable for small boats. This is not salt creek so it is not known what the boat was taken there for, nor who did it.—Ocean Wave.

Last Friday night the Woodmen were neatly surprised at their hall. The ladies whose husbands, brothers, fathers and lovers belong to the order, came in en masse, and after having a good social time with music, etc., spread a lunch for the hungry wood choppers. It will not be long until the Woodmen's Circle, or ladies branch of the order is established, and then the ladies can come out and have a good time occasionally as well as these speculative choppers. This is eminently proper.

Dr. Linton killed a seal in the river at Woods the other day. It is one of the largest specimens seen here for a long time. The appearance of seals in the river indicates the presence of fish. During the fishing season when salmon are most numerous there are always plenty of seals in the river but one is seldom seen at other times.—Wave.

There are a great many fine quarter sections of timber land on Wilson river, many of them just as good as any that have been taken, and can be had by paying the government \$2.50 per acre and some other expenses of filing, proving up, etc. amounting in all to about \$500. Such quarter sections are now bringing \$500 from the company represented by Mr. Steinhilber. Those who have claims for sale should see him.

Dick Jackson, brother of Sheriff Jackson, who was here last week, reports that there is much good country on Siletz, and that some good ranches may be had for the taking. He says that there is good digging in the beach sands, and that mining will be resumed in the summer. A cannery is being put in on the Siletz, and that country is likely to have a boom. Mr. Jackson's post office is Neskwinn, as he lives on Salmon river.

Thirty mining claims from the McMinnville excitement have been filed for record with the county clerk. The claims are located in tp. 4 s r 7 w and the clerk has been notified that there will be about 100 more filed right away. This will bring money into the county treasury as a fee of \$1.00 each is paid for recording the claims. They are nearly all on the head waters of the Big Nestucca, and the formation is said to be similar to that in South Africa. There is plenty of the same material on the head waters of the Trask, and it is to be hoped it will turn out to be rich ore.

Potatoes are scarce here and are being shipped in again. Some few in remote parts of the county have potatoes to sell, but the roads are too bad to get them here. Some who are talking politics now should be planting potatoes. This is an evidence of general laziness when we have such good soil for potatoes, always yielding large crops, and every year shipping in lots of them from Portland or California. They are in demand here now at 50 cents per 100 lbs., and sell at 25 cents in Portland. After being shipped here they will sell at 75 cents to \$1 per 100, as many spoil this time of the year in handling, and the freights are heavy.

Marion Walling, who shot his leg last week is getting along well. The large bone was badly fractured, about twenty pieces being taken out by Drs. Petre and Wiley. This leaves about four inches of space to be filled out in the healing process, though there is a small piece, although broken, extending through the space, and it is thought this will act as a nucleus for forming the new bone. The periosteum, or "striffin" that covers the bone is in fair condition, and there are hopes that the patient will get well and his injured leg be nearly as good as it ever was. In case inflammation sets in, or the bone fails to form anew, it will be probably necessary to amputate the leg.

While Engineer D. B. Ogden, of the government service, was here last week. He made surveys and soundings in the bay to ascertain the results of the dikes that have recently been placed to improve navigation. At the Middle channel dike, much improvement is noticed, the current cutting through toward the Bay City channel. The dike at the mouth of Kilchis is turning the water of that stream via Bay City, and not distributing silt and debris all over the bay. There is a noticeable improvement at the Junction and at Dry Stocking, especially at the latter since the wreck heap has been removed from the old Trask channel. The dikes were all found in good order.

A burglary, something very unusual in this place, occurred last Friday night. Somebody entered C. B. Hadley's saloon by prying the back door open, breaking it badly, and took about ten dollars in small change from the cash register. Certain parties are suspected, and arrests may be made. It is likely a few worthless loafers who are rather suspicious characters, will be invited to move out of town or be subject to arrest for vagrancy in case no other crimes can be fixed upon them. This is the first time a burglary has occurred here for several years. It is thought by many that for the safety of the town against fire or burglars, the marshal should make his beat after midnight instead of before.

The Old Fellows celebration last Saturday was a happy success, and the 77th anniversary was celebrated in an appropriate manner. At the Christian church a very interesting program of recitations and music was given and Noble Grand Selph made a few well conceived remarks. A sumptuous dinner was spread in the large hall of the Allen house, and everybody had a magnificent time. Through the zealous efforts of Geo. Cohn, who acted as auctioneer, a fine cake, made by Mrs. Olsen, was sold several times, being donated to the Rebekahs each time, and brought \$22. The dance at night at the Larsen hall was one of the largest for a long time, and the net profits of it were about \$20. The Rebekahs can make an affair a success when they start out.
