A book to buy.—Webster's International Dictionary. This new book is the authentic, copyrighted "Unabridged" thoroughly revised and enlarged under the supervision of Noah Porter, D.D., LL.D., of Yale University. All were standing to the bargain, and the incipient potato trust succeeded in raising the price from 25 to 35 cents. The genius who instigated the combine quietly sold his spuds at 35 cents, which precipitated a crisis on the potato bourse. Now, a number are long on Early Rose spuds. An ordinary rancher who can bull the Nehalem potato market successfully, and then unload his crop at such a fancy price, is certainly wasting his time in the darksome shades of Nehalem's spruce forests. He should be on Wall street where his thrift could have ample opportunities. [LATER—Don't know about it. The price of potatoes are going up so fast that they are likely to bring more than 40 cents yet.]

### ELECTION PROMISES.

EDITOR HEADLIGHT:—"One who may vote" does right in seeking knowledge. I imagine he represents the views of too many of our people. "Those who would legislate, will you set up a mint and give us free silver?" Undoubtedly they would. Of course the constitution of the United States prohibits any state from coining money, emitting bills of credit, etc., but that don't apply to Tillamook county. If John Hansen, Brooks or Geo. Cohn is elected they will, the next day "set up a mint" and proceed to give such asses as "one who may vote" a lot of free silver, and then this particular ass won't care for answers to his other questions.

"Will you repeal all game and fish laws?" Certainly, the sooner these obnoxious laws are repealed the sooner will our fish and game be exterminated. Notice is hereby given that the common council of Tillamook city, Oregon has ordered that a sidewalk be constructed in accordance with a resolution adopted by the common council on the 15th day of March, 1896.  
Said sidewalk to begin at the south line of Fourth Street at its intersection with the west line of Stillwell Avenue, thence east on the south line of Fourth Street to intersect the sidewalk already built on the north line of the public school property, and to be constructed in accordance with the city ordinance providing for the construction of sidewalks; and that said sidewalk shall be constructed by the owners of the property abutting thereon and adjacent thereto, and to be completed within 30 days from the date of this notice, and under the supervision of the street commissioner.
