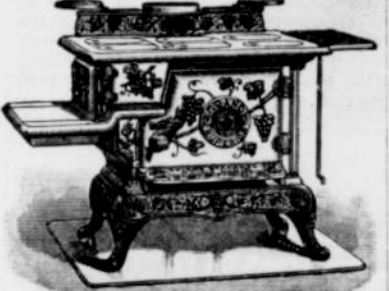

Up to His Old Tricks.

The Monon Seed Co., of Chicago, are
sending out their proposition to pub-
lishers, and the firm has recently been
investigated by a representative of the
Guide. They have offices in the Monon
Block, and it is evident that they in-
tend to have people believe that the
building is owned by them. Such is
not the case as they appear to have
named their company after the build-
ing. The scheme originated in the fer-
tile brain of O. S. Goodby, formerly of
the La Crosse Specialty Co., which
owns several thousand dollars to various
publishers. There appears to be no
one back of this concern. The only
man who seems to be directly interest-
ed in the company is Mr. John Scott. No
satisfaction can be obtained as to their
methods of doing business, and our ad-
vice would be to ask cash in advance.
Their advertisement is sent out as a
reading notice, headed '1000 in prizes.'
Undoubtedly their mail will be tied up
by the post office authorities, as it is a
violation of the lottery law.—Publishers
Guide.
