Arrangements are being made to repair the Tillamook telegraph line as soon as weather will permit and get it ready for business. The line will be removed in some places and made to follow the road at all points where it can be more easily watched and readily repaired. J. F. Reeler and Jim Harris of Wilson river have been engaged to keep the road in repair during the coming summer.—Forest Grove Times.

A man who signed himself "Voter" last week said that the race was between Sappington and Smith for J. P. There has been an almost universal expression since, that such is not the case, and that the race is between Sappington and Bridgeford, in fact that Smith will be third or fourth in the race. It is refreshing.  
Ered Schomburg has gone to considerable pains and expense in fitting up his creamery. He has a small creamery with a centrifugal separator, run by water power, and the temperature and cleanliness of his establishment are kept just right by a running stream of pure, cold water. Mr. Schomburg milks thirty cows. The cows are carefully fed and sheltered, kept clean and healthy, and their teats are always thoroughly cleansed before milking. Absolute purity and freedom from taint is the result of these precautions. The milk is cooled to a low temperature as soon as taken from the cows and is immediately put through the separator, and extreme care is used at every step. The packing and branding is neatly and tastefully done. The result is a most excellent article of butter, sweet, wholesome, of exquisite flavor, besides a good grain and general attractive appearance. Of course, the private creameryman has an advantage

over the creamery that is obliged to take milk from all parties, much of it being slightly tainted, rancid or unclean. In the private dairy the butter maker knows the condition of every pound of milk he uses, and is not obliged to take a little bad milk occasionally because some patron of the creamery brings it and threatens to "pull out" in case his milk is refused. It pays to exercise care in the creamery or dairy. Mr. Schomburg's butter today is retailing in this town at 25 cents per roll, while creamery butter generally is bringing only 30 cents. If a man gains 5 cents per pound on 5000 pounds of butter, the whole gain is \$250, practically all clear profit over and above what the careless butter maker gets. In a few years this extra profit will buy a good dairy ranch. Who would not pay 5 cents per roll extra for butter that is known to be pure, wholesome and of good keeping qualities?  
ing to think that this may be true. It is a serious matter when the people actually contemplate the election of such a man as Smith for J. P., and we are glad to learn that not a great many of them do so.
