We are proud of the list, considering the size of the county, and realize we can't get any more until we get more people here. There never was a time but what the paper gained slowly at least, and the past two months has gained faster than at any time. We presume now we will have to grow only as fast as the county grows. Of the 1000 voters here, there are often several in the same family, there are several who board at hotels or in families, some don't or can't read, some are too poor, and some are too stingy to take a paper. A few would see the Headlight in haste before they would support it, and therefore we can't expect to have exactly all the people on our list, but we have about all the best ones. We are proud of the list and court investigation as to its genuineness, and only a few weeks ago we pared the "dead beats" off very closely. This paper has worked for development of the county the past 8 years, and if we could have increased the population to 10,000 our list would be more than twice as large as it is.
