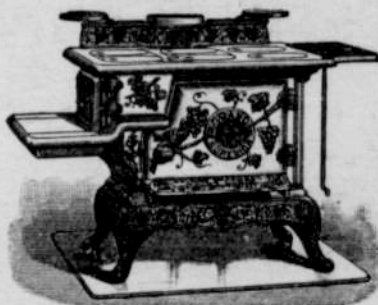

MEDDLESOME FOREIGNERS

MAKE TROUBLE INSTEAD
OF MILKING COWS.

We want foreigners in this county—
some of them are better than our native
Americans, but we want the right kind.
We have a large percentage of the fore-
ign element in this county, mostly
Scandinavians and Germans, who are
very desirable citizens. They are dig-
ging out the forests and improving the
country. They are honest and law
abiding. They pay their debts and
mind their own business. To them we
owe a great deal, but there is a class of
foreign meddlers we do not need here.
We do not need the howling agitators
at all. They are nearly as bad as an-
archists. They are here only to incite
strife and turmoil. They should be
forced to quit politics and preaching
and go to producing potatoes. They
should raise hay instead of hell. They
should employ themselves dairying in-
stead of playing the devil. They should
dig out stumps instead of damning the
community. In short, they should be
put to work, and be forced to keep their
cavernous mouths closed until they are
acclimated. They come here sponging
off the people, and while at it they stir
up all the fanaticism in the country.
Give us a little solid patriotism, and out
with the sham fakirs and adventurers.

Matters of Record.

Some men have the effrontery to deny
the records of the courts, and some
would deny their own records. Anyone
who doubts the following should go to
the county clerk's office or see Judge
Holden and verify the same.

Maulsby was arrested for embezzle-
ment of fines collected, over \$30 in all.
He begged for mercy, and the judge let
him out on a technicality. He paid the
money in then as soon as he could raise
it and was not prosecuted.

About a year ago Chas. Chatterton
was fined \$10 for kicking one E. J. El-
mer. Mr. Chatterton paid the fine and
has a receipt for it. Maulsby turned
in only \$5 of it to the county, saying he
had repented part of it. Chatterton in-
dignantly denies that any part of the
fine was remitted, and says he begged
the Judge to make it \$20 so he could ap-
peal it.

Now, a man who will steal \$5 or \$30
will steal more. Of course, we admit
that Judge Maulsby needed the money,
as he has generally been too generous
with a disreputable class, but he should
have gotten it through the proper chan-
nels. If the county court had allowed
it to him out of the poor fund, it would
have looked better, and been more in
accordance with law.

Furthermore, the records show where
hundreds of dollars have been frittered
away on frivolous prosecutions on ac-
count of Judge Maulsby, and some very
dirty criminals have escaped by his dis-
cretion when the evidence was ample
and damning. Maulsby made a great
many deeds and other legal papers in
early days, and any abstracter of titles
will tell you that it would take thou-
sands of dollars to straighten these mat-
ters out.

Because he is childish, decrepit, and
tottering with infirmities, we refrain
from giving Mr. Maulsby the dressings-
up that he so richly deserves for his
wanton slander and insulting insinua-
tions toward innocent women, and were
he not so feeble, nothing would atone
for his offense except a good horse-
whipping, which he would certainly re-
ceive at the hands of an indignant wom-
an, if he were not so loathsome and re-
pulsive that no respectable person dare
approach him. We certainly have am-
ple reason for administering to him a
most severe castigation, but remain con-
tent with giving the records of his judi-
cial experience here. We hold no
grudge against the poor old man, but
we are under obligations to our family
to set ourselves right before the commu-
nity, though if the editor of this paper
alone were attacked, without inference
toward the family, we should laugh
heartily at all the idiotic cavillings of
the lecherous old monster, who with all
his cumbersome porkerosity, wallows in
his own offal.

ness here in the butcher shop he had

Dr. Petre Dead.

Dr. H. Petre died Saturday evening,
May 23, at the age of 51 years. He was
born January 31st, 1845, in Stark coun-
ty, Ohio, and enlisted in the army in
June, 1861, where he served three years,
being promoted to the rank of major.
He was badly wounded at the battles of
the Wilderness and at Antietam, being
shot through the body. He would per-
haps have lived much longer had it not
been for his wounds. He drew a pen-
sion of \$24 per month. He was in Co.
K, 4th Reg., of Michigan.

In 1868 Dr. Petre was married to Se-
lina J. Sterner, and they had two chil-
dren, Josie and Mollie, who are living.
They came to Oregon in 1880, and to
Tillamook in 1890. Dr. Petre was a
good physician, and especially skilled
in surgery. He was a member of the
Odd Fellows, Masons, and G. A. R. He
was buried Sunday at the I. O. O. F.
cemetery, with Masonic ceremonies,
both fraternal orders, besides the Rebe-
kahs and Eastern Stars being in atten-
dance. The procession was very large,
and only a part of the crowd could get
into the Christian church where Rev.
Dallas conducted the religious services.
The bereaved family have the sympa-
thy of many friends.

CITY ORDINANCES.

An Ordinance to provide for the im-
provement of Fourth Street.
The people of Tillamook city do ordain
as follows:

Whereas the common council of the
city of Tillamook has at different times,
made partial improvements on Fourth
street in the city of Tillamook, and
whereas the common council now pro-
poses to make further improvement on
said street from a point where the south
line of said street intersects the west
line of Stillwell Avenue; thence east
on the south line of said Fourth street
to intersect the side walk already built
on the north line of the public school
property, therefore the people of Tilla-
mook do ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. That Fourth street in Tilla-
mook city shall be improved as follows:
By the building of a cross and side walk
commencing at the south line of Fourth
street at its intersection with the west
line of Stillwell Avenue; thence east
on the south line of said Fourth street
to intersect the sidewalk already built
on the north line of the public school
property.

Sec. 2. That said improvement to be
in accordance with ordinance No. 14, of
the city of Tillamook and entitled "An
ordinance to define the width of side-
walks and the construction of the same."

Sec. 3. That all of said improvements
shall be made at the expense of the ad-
jacent and abutting property, and shall
be completed to the satisfaction of the
street commissioners.

Sec. 4. That as inasmuch as the
owners of the adjacent and abutting
property have had 30 days notice with-
in which to complete and make said im-
provement, as will more fully appear by
the proof thereof duly presented and
filed in the office of the city recorder of
said Tillamook city, and they having
failed so to do, the said city of Tilla-
mook is hereby authorized to proceed
and make said improvements and assess
the cost of the same upon the adjacent
and abutting property.

REGARDING THE DISTRICT ATT'Y

SOME GOOD WORDS FOR

The taxpayers of this district are

orbitant fee in the Harvey estate. The
facts are that Mr. Carson was attorney
for the administrator and also attor-
ney for the widow and some of the
heirs. There was a lengthy contest and
after eighteen months the matter was
settled. Mr. Carson's bill was \$450.00,
and two lawyers, (one of them was
Judge Shaw, a prominent democrat and
a gentleman of the highest standing in
Marion county) testified that the fee of
\$450.00 was a reasonable charge. The
county court decided that some of the
work done had been done for the benefit
of the widow and other heirs, and con-
sequently they should pay for their
share, and accordingly the administra-
tor was directed to pay \$120, and the
balance of the fee of \$450 was paid by
the widow and other heirs, and the re-
ceipts and releases duly executed in the
presence of Hon. Claude Gatch, Mayor
of Salem.

In the Plum divorce suit these same
truthful democrats say Mr. Carson
charged \$1200.00 fee, and they are ex-
hibiting a paper purporting to show
that the fee was fixed at \$1200.00. The
truth is the fee was only \$120.00, and
the paper showing anything else is a
rank forgery.

Another falsehood about Mr. Carson
is that he is not a citizen, that he does
not intend to remain here and that he
said so. All this is untrue. He is a
citizen. The proof of this can be found
in the records in the office of the clerk
of Marion county in May 1889. John
A. Carson is now and has been for years
a property owner and taxpayer in Mar-
ion county, and is a patriotic American
citizen.

Every sort of falsehood and deceit is
resorted to by some democrats to accom-
plish the defeat of John A. Carson, but
the respectable citizens and business
