The climate and other conditions are similar here he says and we have the additional advantage of plenty of pure, cold spring water.

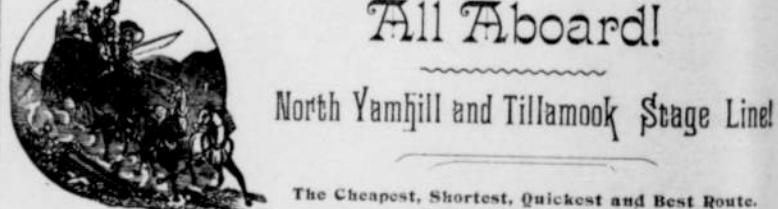
