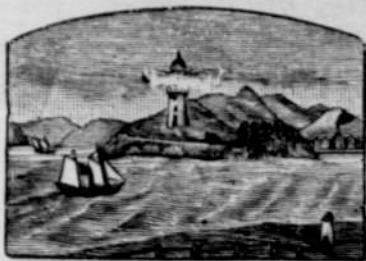

THE PERNICIOUS CREDIT SYSTEM

IT IS UNDERMINING OUR
PROSPERITY.

We are getting tired of talking of the
prosperity of this community, while our
energy is kept up on such a small diet

It is about time to quit vanishing our
local thrift when only a few men seem
to pay their bills promptly and regular-
ly. There is a disposition to put it off,
and put it off, indefinitely.

Men who are able and who could rus-
tle up the money, neglect to do it. They
say "Oh, hain't I good? Well, if you
can't wait on me a little, I'll do my busi-
ness with some other man." And,
many think that because it is "only a
small amount they may wait forever.

There are also a large number here
who are willing to contract debts indis-
criminately in all directions, and never
calculate on their ability to pay. Some
of these have property, but are sure to
lose it.

The credit system is killing the town
It will result in the ruin of many who
try to pay promptly. A few people are
trying to carry a great many, and a col-
lapse is sure to come.

How can a merchant or business man
give credit indiscriminately and exist
long? There needs to be a radical re-
form right in this community. Some
who are now accumulating nothing and
squandering everything would begin to
be prosperous if they were forced to pay
their bills as they go.

The business men here should organ-
ize and adopt a system, and severe re-
gulations regarding the credit habit.
They should demand frequent and regu-
lar settlements and refuse to deal with
those who are too careless to comply.

So far we have not mentioned the
professional dead beats in this article.
They deserve no mercy at all. They
should be blacklisted and refused credit
in every case. Every merchant and
business man in the county should have
a printed list of the dead beats, and it
should be corrected and added to as oc-
casion should require.

Some people who are bumming their
bread, board, beer, whiskey, clothes, to-
bacco and hardware should be shut off
entirely and be forced to labor a little.
Make them stand their share of the
burden of supporting the community,
or drive them out of the county.

There are people here who know no
limit in contracting a store bill, doctor
bill, printing bill, lawyer's bills, livery
bills, whiskey bill, or any other kind of
bills.

The store keeper should demand some
money as he goes along, the lawyer
should make a man put up a good re-
tainer if he wants to go to law, the doc-
tor would have less running about to do
if people knew he intended to have his
pay in a reasonable time, there would
be less whiskey drunk and more profit
to the saloon keeper if a few bums were
cut off, and as far as the printing busi-
ness is concerned, the HEADLIGHT prom-
ises to be more strict than ever from this
on. Our business must be mostly cash
henceforth, and we hereby give notice
that we shall pay no bills (cannot) until
somebody pays us, and that we shall do
no more credit business until we get
some that is due us.

There are many things that a man
can do without quite well, and if he
can't pay for it, let him do without it,
as many of us do.

There are people here who wear pre-
ttyp good clothes and live in pretty good
houses, who look with contempt on the
plain and half-worn-out garments, and
humble habitations of others—yet these
better kept people are in debt to those
who are living plainer and paying their
debts. A little shaking up in this di-
rection here will do good, and we pro-
pose to keep shaking until something is
accomplished.

NESTUCCA NEWS.

[From the Ocean Wave.]

Messrs. Wm. Bewley, Geo. Sunder-
land and Mr. Boyd each came over from
Sheridan Wednesday, with a wagon
load of hotel goods for Mrs. Savage, who
will keep hotel in Woods in the future.

The residence of L. G. Porter at
Ocean Park was burned down Tuesday,
but a portion of his household goods
were saved. The fire is supposed to
have started from a defective flue.

Mr. G. H. Page, of Neskowin, was in
town Wednesday. He says the new
Slab creek road is now open for travel
and several wagons have already passed
over it. This gives the people of Slab
creek and vicinity an outlet to the val-
ley, and is a much nearer route than to
come around by the Little Nestucca. It
is the only free road in Tillamook coun-
ty open at the present time; is compara-
tively level, and can be made a good
road.

C. M. Gage and W. A. Johnson caught
a halibut while out sea fishing Tuesday,
that weighed 64 pounds. It was caught
at a depth of about 150 feet and about
two miles from shore. It has been
known for a number of years that there
were halibut in that particular place,
but there has been little fishing for
them. It has been denied by some that
they were there but the fact that some
are frequently caught proves beyond a
doubt that there is a halibut bank off
this beach.
