Local Markets:—Eggs 10 to 12 cents according to quality and age, dairy butter 20 cents per roll, creamery 25 to 30 cents, chickens \$2 to \$3 per dozen, wool 8 to 10 cents, dry hides 5 to 7 cents, clittim bark 1 to 1 1/2 cents.

Several parties have been seeking relief lately from the county court. According to law the court cannot assist anyone who is physically able to labor, who has any property of his or her own, or who has near relatives able to support such paupers.

G. W. Sappington has taken the office of J. P. and will hold court in the Fearnside building. He has quite a grist of legal business to start with, several cases being filed the first few days. Judge Sappington will no doubt perform the duties of the office in a creditable manner.

Notice to Taxpayers:—The book will be closed July 25 and after that costs will be added. The county court will insist this year on strictly following the letter of the law in regard to making the taxes out of the personal property of delinquents where there is any personal property to be found, and the returns of the sheriff will not be accepted on any other basis. It behooves all to settle their taxes at once.

Sam Elmore was in this city the past few days looking after his property interests here, especially the land he has recently dyked. He is of the opinion that the large slough enclosed will receive enough fresh water to make a good hatchery, and Mr. Elmore contemplates trying the experiment. He says that the number of fish may be increased by millions as has been shown by the experiments on Rogue river.

The amount of taxes collected this year so far is only \$17,000, and is a very poor showing, compared with previous records. We understand the court will not allow the sheriff to be so lenient as usual, and will insist upon the taxes being collected more closely and promptly.

The sheriff has no alternative but to follow the law if the court insists upon it, and the law is just as binding upon the court. It is expected taxes will come in very lively the next two weeks however.

Prof. G. A. Walker and wife, will move to Tillamook. They have been offered places in the school, and will probably accept, as the duties of school superintendent demands much of his time here. Mrs. Hays declined on account of the wages offered, and Mr. Buchanan, of North Yamhill, declined because he secured a more lucrative position.

The understanding is that Mrs. F. R. Beads, Mrs. H. H. Alderman and Miss Josie Petre, the other teachers selected, will accept.

The newly elected county officials: J. D. Edwards, clerk; J. H. Jackson, sheriff; C. H. Wheeler, commissioner; John Barker, treasurer; A. M. Austin, surveyor; G. W. Walker, school superintendent and C. E. Reynolds coronor, were sworn in and took their offices Monday. The only new ones were Edwards, Wheeler and Walker. Tom Coates, deputy clerk and H. F. Goodspeed deputy sheriff, are retained, so there is little change about the court house. The newly elected assessor, J. S. Stephens, will not assume the duties of his office until the first of the year.

T. B. Handley, chairman of the county republican central committee, has brought suit against A. T. White, lately candidate on the republican ticket for county clerk, to recover \$10 due for Mr. White's pro-rata of the campaign expenses. The other republican candidates paid \$2.50 to \$10, according to the salary of the office, but Mr. White neglected to pay his. He alleges that Mr. Handley had no authority to collect the money. The money was raised to pay legitimate campaign expenses, and there is yet due the HEADLIGHT \$11.75 for job printing, stationery, advertising, etc.

Sheriff J. H. Jackson was here Wednesday and attached most of the property of Ocean Park to satisfy the claims of L. G. Porter against the Malaney brothers. A great deal of litigation has originated in Ocean Park during the last few months and it is hard to tell where and when it will end. It is hoped these matters can be terminated at the circuit court including the titles to real estate, as well as other important matters. No one feels safe, or inclined to purchase property, or to locate at the park, until these things are settled. This retards the settlements and growth of the country, and the development of our industries to some extent, and the sooner these matters can be settled the better it will be for the whole community.—Ocean Wave.
