In the suit of T. B. Handley, chairman of the county republican central committee against A. T. Selph was attorney for Mr. Handley and W. L. Brooks appeared for Mr. White.

The hitherto much despised hemlock is coming into use for flooring purposes. The durability of hemlock over pine is remarkable. The floor in the court house in Astoria was laid with 6-inch hemlock flooring forty two years ago, and shows but comparatively little wear. Hemlock lumber cannot be kiln-dried successfully owing to its tendency to warp. Hemlock, after it is thoroughly seasoned, becomes harder than ash, and it is almost impossible to drive a nail in it.

Congressman elect Thos. H. Tongue has received his certificate of election. It recites that N. C. Christiansen Prohibitionist received 1356 votes; Jeff Meyers democrat 7914 Thos. H. Tongue 19355 and W. S. Vanberg 19292 votes. Mr. Tongue's plurality is 63. The certificate bears date of June 27th, 1896, and is signed by Gov. Lord and attested by Sec. of State Kincaid. It is the first document of the kind that has come to a citizen of Washington County.—Hillsboro Independent.

O. P. Coshaw has been appointed by District Attorney Hayden to be deputy attorney for Yamhill county. Claude Thayer of Tillamook was appointed temporarily for Tillamook county; Joseph Sibley of Dallas for Polk county; C. H. Dalrymple of Albany for Linn county. Mr. Hayden has not selected a deputy for Marion county, and intends to attend to the duties of the office in person for the present. He attends his first term of court July 12 at Albany.—Yamhill Reporter.

Pearl W. Geer, secretary of the Oregon State Secular Union, will deliver an address at the court house Saturday evening July 18. Subject: "Why I am a Secularist." All the ladies and gentlemen of Tillamook and vicinity are respectfully invited to attend and learn what Secularists really are and what they teach. An instructive lecture is promised. Pearl Geer, although young, has created quite a stir in religious circles of Portland and the Willamette valley. A good musical and literary program will be rendered. Admission free.

Parson Wilson has been relieved of his position preaching at Bay City, and there are various unpleasant rumors regarding his conduct in that burg, which will come to light later. He intended introducing his successor, the new minister there last Sunday, but developments arose which caused him to conclude he'd rather be away. Wilson has also been relieved of his place on the Herald, and Mr. Edmunds has assumed the arduous duties of editor for the present. Verily, both the predictions come true that some of those who doted on the fresh young preacher would sadly rue it.

Last Monday a schooner was sighted off the bar and as there was no tug in the bay Wm. Neves, Wm. Christolm, and Albert Crawford put off in an open boat to pilot them in. They went several miles off shore but the schooner put out to sea without sighting them. They returned to the bar but it was too late to cross in so they tied up to the buoy and prepared to pass the night there. About 11 o'clock the schooner Lizzie Pien came in and anchored near the bar and the boys went aboard. The captain waited outside for a tug and the boys returned Wednesday.—Nehalem Times.

Over 200 cases of glass fruit jars, stored overhead in Cohn's warehouse took a tumble one day last week. The joints broke, and Abe Cohn, Dave Pierce, and Myron Trowbridge, who were working to brace the swaying joists, were buried beneath the debris of boxes and crushed glass. Strange to say all escaped serious injury, though Mr. Pierce was badly scratched about the face and otherwise bruised. About 25 per cent of the jars was broken. The people of Nehalem are anxious to get a good road up the beach to Astoria. There hasn't been a great deal of road making on the Nehalem, and that section deserves a good outlet. The people of the south end of the county have two outlets, one via Dolph and one via the Slab creek road. The people of Nehalem have none except to Tillamook city, and the south end has that. If there was a good road down the beach from Seaside, a great many coasters would come to Nehalem beach, thereby helping that section of the county. It seems also that Astoria is the best market for Tillamook cattle and has been for years. The present trail is very hard for cattle or pack horses, and the road up the beach would be of great help in driving our best cattle to market. Sometimes the people of Nehalem want to go to Astoria on business. They are bound to do it more or less always, and we can't force them to come here all the time. If we try it, they will studiously boycott this town and do nearly all their business in Astoria. Some of the business men here who derive the greatest benefits from Nehalemites should be willing to be very liberal towards the new beach route. Astoria is exceedingly liberal, expecting to get a great deal of business from Nehalem, and if we can't show a liberal hand on the Necanic road, we ought at least see that there is a good road from Nehalem this way. This would probably appease the Nehalemites, who have always been on good terms with this place. We can, of course, at present force them to attend court and do certain other business here, but they may take a notion to join Clatsop if we ignore them entirely here, and if they unanimously ask it, how can the balance of the people with good grace refuse it! There should also be a good road up the North Fork, and no doubt will be as soon as a few more settlers get in there. In fact, road building is needed all over the county, and we shall all hail the time with pleasure when we can collect enough taxes to build them.
