THE TOWN AND COUNTRY IN GENERAL.

Quite a number went to Netarts last
Sunday.

Fresh fruits just received at the
Bakery.

The steamer Harrison came in the
Bay Saturday.

Grand Lecturer Stroud, of the Mason-
ic order, has been here lately giving the
lodge instructions in Masonic work.

The heat has been excessive in the
Willamette valley, ranging from 100 to
108. The cooling sea breeze protects
Tillamook.

Quite a number of people have insti-
tuted frivolous and malicious prosecu-
tions, and it seems such people never
fail to claim the witness fees.

Mrs. Anne Burton's house on Sutton
creek, burned on July 9th, with valu-
able contents. It was a large house of
six rooms, built five years ago.

L. Blybach, of south Nehalem was
here this week to prove up again on his
Nehalem ranch. There was a mistake
in the description the first time.

H. W. Lasselle, of Albany, was in the
city this week. W. G. Wood, who has
traded for 86 acres of Mr. Lasselle's
land east of town, came in with him.

At this office has been exhibited clo-
ver of second growth four feet and nine
inches in height, and some of third
growth that is three feet, four, all of
which grew in Henry Lowery's orchard.

Mrs. Charlotte E. Washburn, who
formerly lived on the Hunt place near
town, died recently at Woodville, south-
ern Oregon, aged 48 years. The funeral
services were conducted by the Eastern
Star.

The greatest of care should be exer-
cised now regarding forest fires, and the
people of this town should be very care-
ful that the fire doesn't get started here.
These dry times a few minutes' blaze
would do great damage.

Gid Ely, is becoming quite a promi-
nent figure in prize-fighting circles of
Portland, and he is frequently the re-
cipient of a medal and other favors.
Gid is well scenced, and is a pretty
good man physically for one of his size.
It is presumed he finds prize-fighting
more lucrative than preaching.

Only a little work is needed to com-
plete the road due west to Netarts, but
the road can't be traveled at all this
year if that work is not done. The
funds available are all gone, and a little
more will have to be raised. We ought
to be using that road now. The time
for using it will be past in about two
months.

County Surveyor L. E. Wilkes, start-
ed Tuesday morning for T S R 9 W,
where he has a surveying contract.
Mrs. Wilkes started with him, but is to
be left by the seashore in Tillamook
county. During Mr. Wilkes' absence
Mr. Levi Walker will attend to the
duties of county surveyor.—Hillsboro In-
dependent.

Myron Trowbridge, accompanied with
Miss Randall, had quite a thrilling ex-
perience while on their way to Trask.
Something broke about the harness of
the horse he was driving, the animal
began kicking and plunging, being on a
high and dangerous grade at the time,
and finally run away, throwing the oc-
cupants out, upsetting the buggy, break-
ing it, and doing considerable damage
generally. No one was seriously hurt.

Whenever the lumbering business
picks up on this bay and at Nehalem, it
will pay shippers to maintain a tug for
these two bays, and by means of signal-
ing, also by telephone or telegraph, one
tug can easily attend to the shipping of
both bays, and sailing vessels will then
have no difficulty in handling such busi-
ness for this county. This arrange-
ment will save 50 cents to \$1.00 per
thousand on lumber, which is quite an
item, and will perhaps enable this sec-
tion to get a good share of the lum-
ber trade. Mr. Wheeler, of the Neha-
lem mill, is very anxious to see such a
state of affairs come about, and thinks
there will soon be work enough to keep
a tug busy.

While on a trip up the country a short
time since we observed the most inge-
nious contrivance for a farm wagon it has
ever been our lot to behold. The run-
ning gear consisted of a sled for the for-
ward part attached to which were ap-
parently two wheels taken from a hay
rake. Upon this was placed a hay rack
piled high with new cut hay. Necessity
often causes men to resort to queer
make-shifts and this is truly a novel
idea.—Nehalem Times.

Mrs. E. Stanley exhibited at this of-
fice a few days ago a 25 cent piece of the
state of North Carolina, dated in 1862.
It read as follows: "By authority of
the law. The state of North Carolina
will pay to bearer at the treasury on or
before January 1, 1866, twenty-five

WONDERFUL

CATASTROPHE!

A NEHALEM BOY SLAYS A MONSTROUS COUGAR.

[For the benefit of those who read the
following article, we will say that it tells
not half the truth. The fact is the boy
gathered the ferocious beast by the
tongue at the first onslaught, and by
pulling steadily yanked out the tongue,
the spinal cord and tail coming with it;
then the boy, who is only two years old
and in short dress, swallowed the large
Felis pardus whole. From the end of
the tongue to the tip of the tail the
measurement was 76 feet 4 1/2 inches. We
put this in so that nobody will have
any misapprehensions about the truth
and veracity of the Astoria genius who
acts as correspondent for the San Fran-
cisco Examiner in which we notice the
following:]

ASTORIA, July 15.—Robert Steinhauser,
a twelve-year-old boy living at Neha-
lem, about twenty-five miles from here,
is the hero of his village because of a
fight with a panther several days ago in
which he came off first best.

The vicinity in which Robert resides
with his parents is sparsely settled. The
country is wild, but, like many boys
living in the backwoods settlements,
Robert knows no such word as fear.
He attends the little country school,
where the children of the neighborhood
gather three months in the year.

To reach the school Robert must row
several miles down Coal creek, a beau-
tiful mountain stream. The scenery is
picturesque, large spruce and fir trees
overhanging the creek. The boy makes
his morning trip to school in a canoe,
at handling which he has become quite
an expert. He paddles Indian fashion,
always plying his short and rather
heavy oar on one side of his little "dug-
out." The trip to school generally oc-
cupies about an hour's time, the dis-
tance being between three and four
miles.

Last Wednesday morning the little
fellow was paddling down the creek as
usual, thinking more of reading, "rithing"
and "rithmatic" than any possible danger
in the big spruce trees that arched over-
head on each side of the stream. Sud-
denly from the big branches overhead a
big panther dropped into the canoe.
The beast lit in the bow end of the frail
craft, and gathering itself together from
the shock of the fall, balanced itself for
a spring at the boy in the stern.

Robert is an expert swimmer, and
might have gone overboard, where he
would have had the big cat at a disad-
vantage in the water, but his frontier
blood was up, and he would not vacate
his canoe, even for an interloper that
weighed six times as much as he did.

As the cat crouched for a spring, little
Steinhauser rose to his knees and smash-
ed it between the eyes with his paddle
with all his might. The blow broke the
panther's spring, and as it reared on its
haunches the boy caught it another
swinging blow alongside the head, fair-
ly knocking it out of the boat.

Cutlike, the panther did not relish the
water and tried to climb back into the
boat, but Robert balanced the canoe
against the animal's effort to overturn
it, and chopped manfully at the beast's
head with the edge of the paddle as it
clung to the gunwale.

When he finally beat it off he paddled
ahead and was soon out of its reach.
The panther swam ashore, and the boy,
nowise alarmed by his adventure, pad-
dled around the bend, and, landing
crept back through the bushes to see
what had become of his new acquain-
tance. The panther was crouched in
the tree, shaking its head and trying to
rub the water out of its eyes. Satisfied
with this evidence of his prowess, Rob-
ert continued his way to school and told
his adventure to the boys.

One of the boys reported the affair to
father, who lived close by, and the man
went out with a shotgun to look for the
panther. He found it in the tree where
little Steinhauser had last seen it, and
emptied a load of buck shot into its
tawny hide. The panther fell, but be-
fore the hunter could reload the gun it
made off into the swamp. It was trail-
ed a considerable, but finally escaped.

Robert takes his adventure in the
most matter-of-fact way, but the people
in the settlement have made quite a
hero of him. He still paddles his canoe
to school in the morning, but he takes
the precaution now to carry a gun.
