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FILLED CHEESE INDUSTRY KILLED.

We clip from the Chicago Times the following report of the prospects of the filled cheese industry in the region tributary to that city. It is good news and what was expected. When rogues go out of business there will be better opportunities for honest men to get their just deserts.

We let the Tribune's story go in, just as it was printed in that paper, in order that our readers may see how little these writers for city papers know about the great economic problems of the day. Filled cheese not deleterious! It is made chiefly from the curds of skimmed and unskimmed milk.

What is the composition of filled cheese? One-third uncooked "hog fat," one-third casein, (curd) and one-third water.

This is the report:

The recently enacted filled cheese law has practically killed that industry in Illinois. Yesterday Thomas G. English, a deputy, reported to Collector Mize the result of his month's examination and investigation of the business. He was unable to find a single one of the 130 manufacturers in the district who intend to manufacture under the law. All agreed that its terms were prohibitory.

The filled cheese industry along the Fox river and the adjacent dairy sections of the state had grown to large proportions. Last year's business aggregated \$1,000,000. A few manufacturers may continue for the export trade.

The terms of the law are far reaching, and were undoubtedly drawn to kill off the business. A manufacturer must pay an annual tax of \$400 and one cent a pound tax on his product. The cheese must be stamped on the top and bottom and four places on its sides with a stamp of not less than two inches, "Filled cheese." The wholesale dealer must pay an annual tax of \$250.

The prohibition comes into play on the retailer. He must place a sign outside his place of business, in letters not less than six inches, "Filled cheese sold here." He must also pay an annual tax of twelve dollars.

Filled cheese is said not to be a deleterious article. It is made chiefly from the curds of skimmed and unskimmed milk. The law enumerates butter as an article of filling, and shuts out future mixing.

The law goes into effect on September 1. Manufacturers along the Fox river region are already shutting down their establishments and working off their stocks. Last year the factories made 14,000,000 pounds, of which amount 3,000,000 pounds were exported.

A few days ago a well-known Tillamooker, whose name is not best to divulge, cut into a pound of butter which he had purchased at a grocery store whose proprietor does not advertise, and found therein a small tin box which contained a piece of paper bearing the following words written in a neat feminine hand: "I am a girl 18 years of age, good looking and an excellent house keeper. Should

this be found by some smart, unmarried Christian will he please write to the following address," etc. The finder being a bachelor decided to unravel the affair and succeeded only to destroy the romance. The girl who had written the note had died many years ago, leaving an aged husband and a grown family.—Adapted, from Astoria Herald.

CONVERSION OF A TREE INTO A NEWS-PAPER IN ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-FIVE MINUTES.

We take from the Centralblatt fur Oesterreichungarische Papierindustrie the following account of a curious experiment:

A very interesting experiment was made on April 17 last at Messrs. Menzel & Company's paper wood pulp manufactory, at Elsenenthal, in order to ascertain what was the shortest space of time in which it was possible to convert the wood of a standing tree into paper, and the latter into a journal ready for delivery. This experiment is of extreme importance, because it shows what rapidity can be attained by the concurrence of practical machines and favorable conditions.

Three trees were felled in a forest near the establishment at thirty-five minutes past seven, in the presence of two of the owners of the manufactory and a notary whom they had called upon to certify as to the authenticity of the experiment. These trees were carried to the manufactory, where they were cut into pieces 12 inches in length, which were then decorated and split. The wood thus prepared was afterward raised by an elevator to the five debarkers of the works.

The wood pulp produced by these machines was then put into a vat, where it was mixed with necessary materials. This process finished, the liquid pulp was sent to the paper machine. At thirty-four minutes past nine in the morning, the first sheet of paper was finished. The entire manufactory had thus consumed but one hour and forty-nine minutes.

The owners of the manufactory, accompanied by the notary, then took a few of the sheets to a printing office situated at a distance of about two and a half miles from the works. At ten o'clock a copy of the printed journal was in the hands of the party; so that it had taken two hours and twenty-five minutes to convert the wood of a standing tree into a journal ready for delivery.

It must be added that, during the course of the manufacture, there occurred a few interruptions which might be avoided at another time, and that, in the opinion of the two manufacturers, had it not been for this, twenty minutes might have been gained.—Moniteur de la Papeterie.

The dairy law of California has suppressed the oleo and filled cheese traffic in the state with the use of little over one-fourth the appropriation of \$12,000. The great packing houses and the bogus cheese makers have given up the fight here, but there is danger that small dealers and alleged dairymen will attempt adulteration in a crude way. There is need for close watch for these and also vigilance as to the eastern manufacturers, who will take advantage of any relaxation in watching our markets.—Western Creamery.

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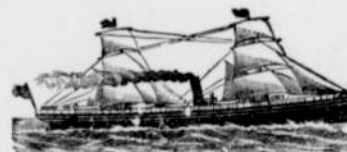
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
