Local Markets—Eggs 12½ to 15 cents, new potatoes \$1 per bushel; chickens \$2 to \$2.50 per dozen; butter still advancing, solid packed in good demand at 12½ to 13 cents per lb., dairy 25 to 30 cents per roll, creamery 35 to 40 cents per roll, honey 12½ cents.

Governor Bowers was up from Bay City this week. He is running both sides of his logging camp since the Truckee mills started. Gov. says he contemplates having Doc. Linton brought up and tried before the Circuit court to test his veracity.

Taxes have been coming in very rapidly the past few days. The sheriff has extended the time until August 5th, which is the latest date possible he can wait and obey the order of the court. There can be no further delay before he begins to levy on personal property.

A large lot of halibut, shipped from the Sound to Astoria, was brought in last trip of the Harrison. We ought to send to eastern Oregon for our butter and lumber. It is already demonstrated the people here would rather send out for their potatoes and onions than to raise them. By the way, maybe we could get our clams and fish supply in eastern Oregon.

People who like to gaze upon a complete silver table set, consisting of knives, forks, table spoons, teaspoons, butter knife, sugar shell, teapot, sugar bowl, butter dish, cream pitcher, spoon holder, should look at those displayed in that case in the window at Williams' drug store. There is an unusually large crop of fine honey on the Nestucca this year and the local demand, including what is sold to the coasters, is not enough to use it up. The merchants here are well supplied and it is bringing only 12½ cents per pound. They have tried to ship it to Portland by boat, but the boats handle it so roughly that it is not in good order, and those merchants who have tried the experiment have lost considerable. The ranchers on Nestucca haul it to the valley 30 or 40 miles over rough roads in wagons and get it through in good order. It looks as if the boats could handle it so as not to break the combs if proper care is taken. Although California is supposed to be the greatest honey producing country in the world, and California honey is very fine in appearance, yet it lacks the superb flavor of the Nestucca article, and it is thought some of the latter could be sold in San Francisco, if a few boxes were sent there as trial shipments. Perhaps the steamer Truckee would see that it is landed in good condition. The HEADLIGHT will send a few sample sections to some San Francisco people and try the experiment though it would be well for some who have quantities of it to sell, to send a box to J. S. Kimball, 22 Market St., who takes an interest in finding a market for Tillamook produce, he being the owner of the steamer Truckee, and naturally anxious to build up a shipping trade.

Be Careful With Fires. ED. HEADLIGHT:—I desire through your columns to call the attention of the justices of the peace and the constables of this county as well as of all public spirited citizens to the necessity of preventing timber fires. These originate, in most cases, I believe, from camping parties. These people are too often careless or ignorant of the disastrous effects of a camp fire left burning. Where it is possible, campers should be noticed, their names and residence learned and if they depart leaving unextinguished fires, information should be communicated to me at once. The important resources of the county in the way of timber lands is likely to be seriously injured and many thousand dollars worth of property destroyed by simply thoughtlessness.

Geo. Weston, one of the most noted aeronauts in America, will make a balloon ascension here next Saturday afternoon, July 25. Mr. Weston doesn't go round with "Prof." attached to his name as the ordinary fakir, but modestly goes along giving good performances. He is well spoken of wherever he has been, and the San Francisco Call recently had over two columns, profusely illustrated, regarding Mr. Weston's feats and ideas of balloons. Mr. Weston has arranged with the insurgent authorities in Cuba to make balloon ascensions for them for the purpose of making observations of Spanish armies and dropping bombs in their forts. He will go to Cuba soon—when the rainy season is over. The performance here Saturday will be in an open lot, and no admission fee will be charged. The business men of the town raised money to secure the performance. Mr. Weston performs on the trapeze while thousands of feet above the earth and finally leaps from the balloon with a parachute, falling several hundred feet before the parachute opens. The balloon used is the biggest on the coast. There will be a steam swing in town the same day.
