THE POPULISTS ENDORSE BRYAN

BUT SAY WATSON INSTEAD
OF SEWALL.

The populists at their convention en-
dorsed Bryan, the sentiment in his favor
being nearly unanimous. A few mid-
dle-road men held out against it, but it
availed nothing.

When it came to endorsing Sewall for
vice president however, there was a
general kick, and Tom Watson, of Geor-
gia received the nomination. The ob-
jections to Sewall are that he is a bank-
er, a millionaire, and has a monopoly of
ship building in the east—in fact that
he is entirely in sympathy with plutoc-
racy, and a promoter of trusts, all of
which objections seem well grounded.

It is reported that Bryan will not ac-
cept the populist nomination since the
populists did not endorse Sewall, though
it is thought the matter will be patched
up by the national committees of the
democrats and populists.

Sewall may be withdrawn, or the elec-
toral vote may be divided by states ac-
cording to which are strongest, demo-
crats or populists, with the understand-
ing that all the electoral votes go to the
same man after election.

There is also some understanding
about dividing the spoils in case of suc-
cess—it being quite apparent that Teller
will be made secretary of the treasury
in case the combination wins.

The silver convention, composed
mostly of republicans, which met about
the same time endorsed Bryan.

Although there are a few defections,
the combination seems to be very for-
midable, and may make a very close
contest unless the two national commit-
tees get to quarreling over the spoils.

It seems however that those demo-
crats and populists who have been talk-
ing free silver so loud should be capable
of coming to a fair understanding if they
are sincere, and they surely need
not expect much assistance of free silver
republicans unless they do. If they
don't pull together in this instance, they
should ever after hold their peace.

The populists are chumps if they let
the democrats swallow them up entirely
and they surely will not let the demo-
crats name all the candidates, take all
the spoils, and completely knock out the
populist organization. The populists
did right in substituting Watson for
Sewall and making other demands.

BALLOON ASCENSION.

The Affair was a Great Success—Large
Crowd.

There was a large crowd here Satur-
day to witness the balloon ascension,
more people being present than at the
4th of July celebration, and perhaps
more than were ever present at one time
in Tillamook on any previous occasion.

The weather was fine, though some-
what cloudy, and the only difficulty was
that the wind was rather strong, so the
ascension came off late in the evening.

Mr. Geo. Weston, who made the as-
cension, did everything that he prom-
ised and nobody was of the opinion he
was a fakir after the ascension. He
went up about 2000 feet, hanging to the
bar by his hands, without the aid of



straps, hooks, or other contrivances, and
he gave some good performances while
going up, hanging by his feet, turning
on the bar, and various other athletic
feats.

The balloon started from the corner
opposite Hadley's saloon, and when fill-
ed, went up like a dart in a southeasterly
direction, there being a stiff breeze
from the north west. It veered to the
north and then to the south, and when
directly over the academy he cut loose
from it, and with the parachute, de-
scended quite easily, performing all the
time, and alighted on terra firma near
the May Academy. The balloon came
down about the same time, and fell
across a barbed wire fence near T. B.
Hadley's residence, no damage done
except a few holes being torn in it on
the barbed wire.

The balloon is about 65 feet high when
filled, 40 feet in diameter, holds 36,000
cubic feet of gas, and about 1000 yards
of muslin was used in making it. It
has made only a few ascensions, ten or
twelve, but has been partially burned,
often torn, and is black with smoke.
The life of a balloon is very short, and
they are mostly made now of a fairly
good grade of sheeting. It was filled
with hot air, and a mixture of gas, gen-
erated by pouring gradually a few cans
of kerosene and gasoline mixed into a
furnace.

The trapeze and hand bar is about 150
feet from the top of the balloon, and
by means of pulling a line the acro-
mat works a knife which cuts it loose
from the balloon. It is made of strong
sheeting and cords, and after dropping
100 feet it dilates, and usually allows the
balloonist to sail down like a large bird.
When the parachute is cut loose the bal-
loon gradually turns over, the hot air
and gas escapes, and it falls with a dull
thud to the earth.

Mr. Weston made an ascension again
Sunday before nearly as large a crowd
as on the day before, and with about
the same results. This time he went up
hanging by a strap across the back of
his head, a feat which made the strong-
est hearts shudder, and he came ashore
safely near J. D. Edwards' house with
the parachute, the balloon falling near
the court house.

All expressed great satisfaction re-
garding the performances, and it was
a rare treat for Tillamookers, many of
the younger ones having never had an
opportunity of seeing a balloon as-
cension before—in fact the first for this
place.
