The Danes use vast quantities of ice for their milk and butter, and consider the cost trifling. For deep setting (practiced in some dairies) for making butter firm, and for many other purposes, this abundance of ice is very useful.—Hoard's Dairyman.

LUMBERING.

Most of the logging camps in the Grays Harbor country are shut down and it is reported that there has not been a time in ten years when so little logging has been done. The burning of the Northwestern Lumber Co's. plant has much to do with it.

An accident occurred at the Sturn saw mill at the mouth of the Arkansas creek opposite Cathlamet July 3rd by the current of the river undermining the bank for about fifty feet, causing the boiler, pump and water tank to drop into the Cowlitz river in about ten feet of water.

An effort is being made to get a twenty-five year franchise for booming purposes on the Clackamas river through Clackamas county, but is being met with strong opposition. It is held that it is against public policy and the good of the people that the large streams should be in the hands of one firm. The Oregon City Enterprise says that in the eastern states where they have been logging for years on just as rugged streams as the Clackamas such a monopoly would not be allowed or tolerated for a day.

L. H. Radcliff at the Cedar valley saw mill met with a frightful death last month. He was engaged in "off bearing" behind the saw. He was taking away a slab that had just been cut, but, instead of rolling it down the rolls, he picked it up and started to pass it over the saw. Mr. Slocan saw it was going to strike the saw and yelled to him to look out. At that instant Radcliff was jerked upon the saw, his body badly cut, and thrown over the log that was on the carriage to the floor of the mill. He made an effort to rise, but fell back dead.

Canada, with all her immense forest area, is coming to realize that it will not be long before her good merchantable timber will be a scarce commodity. One of the persons who is looking into the future is Mr. Thomas Conant, of Oshawa, Ont., who, in the last two years, has planted about 12,000 trees, consisting of black walnut, red cedar and shell bark hickory. The Canadian Lumberman, commenting on this fact says: "We in Canada have been so accustomed to being surrounded on every side with an abundance of wood that few of us realize the rate at which it is disappearing and the nearness of the time when our forests will, to a large extent, have disappeared. It behooves us to make provision for the future."
