An exceedingly big rush of job work this week has caused some delay, but the office will catch up with the work in a day or two unless too many new jobs come in.

We are informed that one creamery in this county has distributed over \$20,000 among its patrons in the past year, and about \$150,000 has been paid to Tillamook for butter and cheese in the last year.

Local Markets:—Eggs 15 cents, dairy butter 30 to 35 cents for 2 lb rolls, creamery 40 to 45 cents per roll, solid packed 12 1/2 to 15 cents per pound, potatoes 11 1/2 to 1 1/2 cents per pound. Hides of all descriptions in demand.

Mr. J. H. Page, of Page & Son, the leading produce commission house of Portland, is traveling over this county looking into the butter and cheese industry. He thinks the climate, water and grass are highly conducive towards producing butter and cheese of the best flavors, and he suggests that the principal thing now for the farmers or dairymen to learn is to secure high grades of stock, give more care to handling milk, and to advertise the merits of the products here by making exhibits at the Expositions.

One thing is fully demonstrated by the recent fire alarms, and that is, there is need of several more members in the fire company. It is pretty hard for two or three men to pull a heavy pump or engine, and while some citizens who are not firemen help to pull the trucks, the most of them rush like madmen to the scene of the fire, doing nothing of actual service, and a few firemen generally loiter in leisurely after the fire is over. Of course, it should be remembered that the firemen are under no more obligations to the public than anybody else to fight fire and not so much, in fact, as they have put in a great deal of time, hard work and money to keep the organization and apparatus in good shape, getting nothing particular in return. Besides they have to pay fines if they happen to be absent from one of the meetings, and many of the firemen are poor men, having very little or no property to protect.

There were two fire alarms Tuesday, one being a still alarm about 11 o'clock at night. In the evening the fire bell was rung, and the Hook and Ladder Co., with pump, hose cart, and ladder truck, was soon on its way to Dr. Patchen's building, now occupied by John Hansen. Before the boys could get there, however, word came that all was safe. It appears that there was a hole in the chimney which allowed smoke to escape in the attic, and this coming out through the roof was seen by parties who gave the alarm, thinking the house on fire. Mr. Hansen promises to see that the holes in the chimney are patched up, and it is well too, as the Patchen building is in the north west part of the town, and with the breeze Tuesday all the town would have burned up in spite of such apparatus as we have here, should a fire get started in that quarter. Late at night it was discovered that the timbers and slab filling under the furnace at the mill was on fire. It had perhaps been burning several days, and the heat of the furnace had caused to be formed a veritable bed of charcoal underneath, when first noticed it was beginning to blaze and in a few minutes would have reached a part of the mill that is very oily, which would have started a blaze that could not have been controlled, in very short order. The hose at the mill was turned on it, and while checking the blaze, did not seem sufficient to put the fire out completely. Several of the firemen and other citizens were notified quietly and the pump and hose cart were soon on the scene pumping water from the slough. A flood of water was turned under the furnace, and it is presumed the fire is out, though the Mill Co. will at once take measures to make everything safe.

There will be another balloon ascension here next Saturday afternoon by Geo. Weston, and he will also do some sensational performing while in mid air. It will be entirely different from anything yet. There will also be tight rope walking on a line stretched across the street from the tops of the buildings, and some daring feats will be performed. The swing will run as usual until Saturday evening, and a prize of one dozen cabinet photos will be given to the best lady rider, beside a gold watch will be given to the most popular lady, to be decided by a voting contest.

Judge Bollinger and M. O. Lowndale went up the south fork of the Nehalem fishing Sunday, and had an experience they will not soon forget. Bill Smith and Dan Perry acted as guides, and after going as far as possible by wagon and trail, they took a boat, intending to make their way to Salmonberry creek. They had much difficulty in pulling the boat over the rapids, and when near the Narrows, the current swamped the boat and washed away nearly all of their clothing, provisions and fishing tackle. They had the boat left however and came down braving the rapids, with many thrilling experiences. They were thoroughly prepared to eat when they reached a place where they could get food. Mr. Perry lost most of his clothing, and Judge Bollinger gave him most of what he had. It will be some time perhaps before they try to ascend the river with a canoe—it is easier and safer coming down.

While Geo. Weston, the balloonist, was taking up a collection Saturday, he got into a fight with Frank Wheeler, who lives just south of town. Weston was arrested for assault and battery, and was tried Monday before Judge Sappington and a jury. He was promptly acquitted by the jury. District Attorney Claude Thayer prosecuted, and T. B. Handley defended. From the evidence it appears that Frank Wheeler was sitting with his father on the walk near Hadley's saloon watching the inflation of the balloon, when Weston came around passing his hat for contributions. The merchants had guaranteed a certain amount for expenses and Weston expected to get some more by a collection. It was getting late and some of the ranchers were impatient to see the balloon go up so they could get home and do their milking. Consequently there was some murmuring of dissatisfaction in the crowd. It is claimed Wheeler contributed nothing, and that he and his father talked insultingly to Weston, the old man calling him a fakir. Weston called him a liar, and Frank resented what he termed an unwarranted insult to his father. He made a pass at Weston, but in about two minutes, Weston polished him up to the Queen's taste. The athlete had the advantage all through the scrimmage and didn't get a scratch, while Wheeler's peepers were so battered up that he could scarcely see the balloon ascension which occurred a little later. Eye witnesses differ materially about who was the aggressor, and for a few minutes some were considerably excited, thinking that an outsider was getting too fresh, and there were cries of "Throw him in the slough, Lang him, etc." but those of a more popular turn kept yelling "Put him in the balloon, Send him up." The deputy marshal arrested him, and he put up cash bail. The excitement died down in a few minutes, most all seemed anxious for fair play, and the balloon went up as if nothing had happened. Weston plead guilty to the charge of "fighting on the streets" before city recorder H. H. Alderman and was fined \$5. Mr. Weston then filed a complaint charging Wheeler with the same offense, and Wheeler got his trial postponed until Wednesday because he didn't want to plead until after he had finished his prosecution of Weston before Judge Sappington. He came Wednesday prepared to plead guilty, but the recorder waited until after 11 o'clock and as the prosecution did not appear, the case was dismissed. It was an oversight on the part of the prosecution—in fact they forgot it until too late. The licking Frank got is perhaps sufficient punishment.

Ed. HEADLIGHT:—As a poor and humble citizen of this burg I should like to know how long our astute city council proposes to pay a man \$30 per month for nothing.

It may be nobody's business but the council's and the marshal's, nevertheless, with fear and trembling as befits one approaching and august assemblage I venture the question.

[In reference to the above it will be fair to state that some time ago the council decided to pay the marshal some extra, if the business men here would raise \$10 per month also, and have him on at night when needed instead of the day time. There is really little or no use for a paid marshal in the day time, a special deputy being able to handle all the work for the fees in it, but at night nearly all the disturbances occur, and as a precaution against fires started a night watchman is quite essential in the summer time. No action was taken by the business men to raise the amount, and nothing was done. The people in the outskirts of the city argue that the marshal or fire protection is of little use to them, hence they feel that the business men should bear the biggest portion of the expense. However, there are two sides to this question, as the revenue all comes from saloon licenses, no tax being levied, and in case the town should burn down now, it would be almost impossible to rebuild it, considering the hard times, and the fact that some have not fully recovered from the fire of three years ago. By all means let's have the worth of our money for what we do pay the marshal. Put him on at night only, and if \$30 per month will not pay him for an all night service, let him stay on a part of the night.—Ed.]
