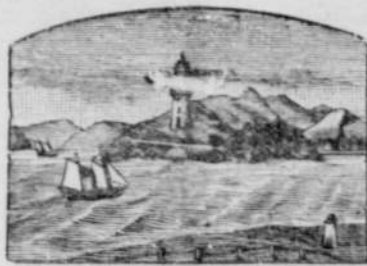

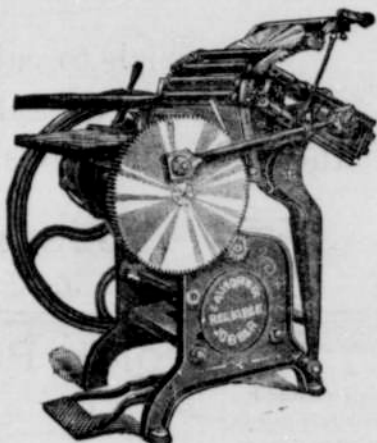

"DID SOMETHING."

AND BEHOLD HIS CONSTITUENTS REJOICE

List of Public Spirited Citizens
Reprinted.

Ore town, Ogn., Jan. 21, '97.

Editor HEADLIGHT:

We see by the last
issue of the HEADLIGHT that our com-
missioner has done something; and as
we, the people of the south end of the
county have been looking, yea expect-
ing, yes, even urging him to do some-
thing, we are elated! Yes, tickled near-
ly to distraction from the fact that he,
our commissioner, has done something,
and the proof is beyond dispute!

The people of the south end of the
county three years ago saw that they
needed someone to look after the gen-
eral interests of this end of the county,
and so by this commissioner district
were allowed the selection of a commis-
sioner. We were much pleased. We
nominated and elected Mr. Harvey.
The upper end of the county elected Mr.
Alley. County court sat. All were
there. County court adjourned. All
drew pay. Next meeting, ditto, and so
on. "Well," we ask, "why don't the

cent from the fees of the county court;
all draw their pay again. We say to
our commissioner, "Why don't you do
something?" "Well, the judge won't,
and whatever he says Mr. Alley
seconds."

We go to Tillamook occasionally to
pay taxes, etc. People meeting us say,
"Well, what kind of a commissioner
have you fellows sent up here?" We
answer, "He's all right." "Yes," they
say, "it's just as Conder says; if Conder
says it's all right, all right goes! Har-
vey is just like a piece of putty."

Now, Mr. Editor, it's because of all
this misunderstanding that we write you.
We are elated—yes, tickled nigh unto
death! For we are fully aware that our
commissioner has done something;
and as this may be the last act of his
life, we adjure you to not be too outspok-
en, for we have been expecting it for so
long; and not only this, it relieves the
judge from such an embarrassing posi-
tion; for he evidently no longer holds
the key to the position—and our com-
missioner will have to do something.

Now, Mr. Editor, I will write you
again as soon as I learn that our com-
missioner has done something.
