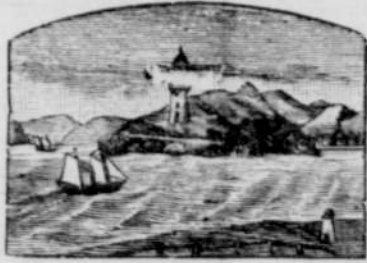

J. H. Jackson filed his official bond as tax collector in the sum of \$5000.	
The following supervisors filed their bonds in the sum of \$100 each:	
H. A. Bloom, Dist. No. 1; John Hick- ey, Dist. No. 2; Frank Severance, Dist. No. 3; J. J. McGinnis, Dist. No. 6; G. E. Mizner, Dist. No. 6; and the bonds were approved.	
The HEADLIGHT, after submitting sworn statement and list of subscribers, there being no contest, was designated by the court as the official county paper, it being the paper of largest circula- tion.	
In the matter of the tax levy for 1897, the Commissioner found that the total value of the taxable property in the county the year 1896 as equalized by the county court, is \$1,153,514, and it was found that it would be necessary to raise the following amounts by taxation for the purposes indicated:	
Salary of officers, expense of justice courts, expense of circuit court, bridge work, wood and oil for Court house, printing books, stationery, etc., \$14, 764.87; for public schools, \$2.67 per capita, for 1613 pupils, \$4,614.06; for building and improving roads and pub- lic highways, \$767.67; for the support of indigent soldiers in the county, \$115.35; for state tax, \$4014.06. In accordance with the law, therefore, the following levy was made:	
For state tax 4 mills on each dollar assessed	
For County General Purposes 12 1/2—10 mills.	
For Public Schools, 4 mills.	
" Roads and Highways, 5 mills.	
" Indigent Soldiers, 1—10 "	
" Incidental Expenses 1—10 "	
And on each male person in said county and state who is liable to a state poll tax the sum of \$2.00 poll tax was levied.	
It was ordered that the clerk extend the assessment roll of the county and place a warrant thereon for the collec- tion of said taxes, and deliver said tax roll to the sheriff for collection.	
J. D. Wallace was allowed \$10.00 for 5 days' services as road supervisor.	
The attorney general and the District Attorney of the 3d Judicial District were memorialized in a series of resolutions to use every means in their power to secure the advancement on the calen- dar of the supreme Court and early settlement of the case entitled, The Little Nestucca Toll Road Company, Appellant, vs Tillamook County, Respondent; and the clerk of the court was ordered to forward a certified copy of the resolutions to the officers afore- said.
