Teacher's Examination.

We give below a portion of the questions asked at the last teachers' examination. The balance of the questions will be given in our next issue. We give them in full because we believe they will be interesting to all our readers—to the parents as indicating the qualifications of those who teach their children, and to children as indicating somewhat the line of questioning that they themselves will be subjected to should they hereafter desire to become teachers.

WRITTEN ARITHMETIC.

1. Sixteen credits, answers only. (a.) How many strips of carpet 1 yard wide in a room 42x50 feet? (b.) How many yards in each strip? (c.) Bushels in 4,200 pounds of wheat? (d.) Acres in a strip of land 20 rods wide across one side of a section? (e.) Feet in length of a pile of wood 6 feet high and 4 feet wide, containing 15 cords? (f.) Gallons in 5,373 cubic inches? (g.) Pounds in 28,500 grains Troy? (h.) Board feet in a stick of timber 20 feet long, 8 inches wide and 6 inches thick?
2. Ten credits. The amount of B's money for 8 years at 6 per cent is \$5,100 more than the interest of his money for 10 years at 8 per cent. What is B's money?
3. Twelve credits. (a.) Find the missing element or term in the following: The interest is \$5.84; the rate is 6 per cent; the principal \$60; the time is —? (b.) The interest is \$88.20; the rate 7 per cent; the time 3 years, 6 months; the principal is —? (c.) The principal is \$400; the interest is \$32.40; the time 7 years, 8 months; the rate is —?
4. Ten credits. The longitude of St. Paul, Minnesota, is 95 degrees, 4 minutes, and 55 seconds west, and of Berlin 13 degrees 23 minutes and 45 seconds east: what is the difference of longitude? What is the difference of time? When it is 12 o'clock in St. Paul what time is it in Berlin?
5. Six credits. What is the face of a 90 day note, the proceeds of which, discounted at 6 per cent, are \$2000?
6. Twelve credits: (a.) What is the relation of 288 to 16-27? (b.) What is the relation of 3-7 to 12? (c.) The divisor is .002, the quotient is 5, the remainder .002; what is the dividend?
7. Twelve credits. The diameter of a circle is 5 feet; what is its area? Its circumference? The hypotenuse of a right angle triangle is 15 feet, and the base is 12 feet; what is the perpendicular? What is the area?
8. Six credits. What is the square root of 64? What are the dimensions of a cubical chest which shall contain 64,000 cubic feet?
9. Ten credits. Seventy horses can eat a lot of grain in 72 days; in what time will 3 times as much grain be consumed if to horses are added when the grain is $\frac{1}{2}$ eaten?
10. Six credits. If you send \$1,830 to an agent to invest, after deducting his commission at 2 per cent, what sum does he invest?
