The cabinet of President McKinley is composed as follows: Secretary of State, John Sherman of Ohio; Secretary of the Treasury, Lyman J. Gage, of Illinois; Secretary of War, Gen. Russell A. Alger, of Michigan; Attorney General, Joseph McKenna, of California; Postmaster General, James A. Gary, of Maryland; Secretary of Navy, John D. Long, of Massachusetts; Secretary of the Interior, Cornelius N. Bliss, of New York; Secretary of Agriculture, James Wilson, of Iowa. The selections are mainly good ones. All sections of the country are well represented, and in that particular the people will doubtless be satisfied.

The condition in Crete remains unchanged. The powers still maintain their attitude. Greece, however, is not to be coerced into withdrawing its troops. Its prime minister, Delyannis, has notified the powers that Greece would prefer to disappear from the map of Europe rather than retire from Crete and allow all the Christians there to be massacred by the fanatical Moslems. The voice of the whole nation is for war. In the meantime, a change of public sentiment is rapidly spreading in Europe, and the action of the powers in assisting Turkey is being strongly condemned. Gladstone, ex premier of England, and the greatest living statesman of Europe, on March 5th sent the following telegram to the London Daily Chronicle:

"To expel the Greeks from Crete and to keep as police the butchers of Armenia will further deepen the disgrace of the powers." One hundred leading liberal and Irish members of Parliament have sent telegrams to the king of Greece expressing sympathy with him and his cause. The whole Italian nation is in sympathy with Greece. It is not likely that the powers will maintain their present attitude very long, but they will probably withdraw and allow the two interested nations to settle the matter in the war that now seems inevitable.

The veto of the Anti-Immigration Bill by President Cleveland was about the worst and most mischievous of all the vetoes which rendered his administration notorious. The greatest menace to American institutions today is the presence of a large illiterate, unintelligent and vicious element in our country—an element strong enough to, in many instances, control municipal, county, and even state elections. One of the principal factors in the present industrial depression is the presence of vast numbers of foreign laborers who stand ready to underbid the native American workingman in the struggle for daily bread, and drive him into yet deeper poverty. It was to remedy these defects that the bill in question was intended, and the interposition of Cleveland's veto was a great misfortune. But when was Grover Cleveland ever known to do anything that even

in a remote sense could benefit the workingman? But we have one consolation, the man now in the President's chair is a man of the people, and Grover and his veto are both things of the past.

Governor Lord Appoints a Senator

The action of Governor Lord in appointing Henry Corbett United States Senator to succeed ex-Senator Mitchell, will be hailed by all the best republicans in the State as a wise and sensible act. The failure of the Legislature to organize and elect a senator left the position vacant, and the State would have had but one senator had not the governor made an appointment. This would have been not only against the best interests of this state but the entire country as well, as the United States senate is exceedingly close and the republicans will need every vote they can get. Corbett is a man well fitted to fill the position. He has always been identified with the best elements of politics in this state. He is a man of affairs, a man of marked ability and of unswerving integrity, and his devotion to the principles of the republican party and the best interests of the state, are beyond question. Whether or not he will be seated by the Senate remains to be seen, but the probabilities are that he will. Anyway Governor Lord has done his duty and the people of Oregon are satisfied.

McKinley's Inaugural Address.

President McKinley's inaugural address has been well received by the people of all parties. In length it is not so formidable as the stately addresses of his predecessor. In construction it is simplicity itself. In rhetoric it is deficient—but it is deficient in rhetoric alone. The address does not evince the pedantry of a Cleveland nor the profound statesmanship of a Blaine, but it does evince a deep appreciation of the responsibilities of his position and a conscientious determination to carry out the will of the people who placed him in power. President McKinley evidently considers himself the servant of the people, and not, as did President Cleveland, the ruler of the people. He expresses himself in favor of a revision of our financial system, but evidently does not share his predecessor's intense hatred of everything except gold; he wisely holds that most of our financial laws are the result of experience and trial and should not be amended without investigation and demonstration of the wisdom of proposed changes. He favors the creation of a commission of our ablest financiers to "take under early consideration the revision of our coming banking and currency laws and give them that exhaustive, careful and dispassionate examination which the circumstances demand." The president favors and promises ceaseless efforts to secure international bimetallism, and until that shall be secured, the maintaining of our silver coin at a parity with gold. He favors the severest economy in public expenditures and that these if necessary be decreased until they no longer exceed the nation's income.

He further favors immediate steps for the increase of the nation's revenue and that this revenue be produced, not by taxing what we ourselves produce, but by taxes on foreign productions entering the United States. So urgent does the President consider this matter that he will call Congress together in extraordinary session on the fifteenth day of the present month to devise ways and means to meet the immediate needs of the country. The business outlook the President does not consider very promising and he frankly says "it will take time to restore the prosperity of former years" but he thinks this will be greatly aided by the prompt and intelligent action of Congress.

Reciprocity is strongly favored and will doubtless be extended as

rapidly as possible. Lynchings are condemned unsparringly, as are also trusts and all combinations made to arbitrarily control the conditions of trade among our citizens. The President favors more stringent immigration laws and the shutting out of all illiterate and vicious classes. Reform in the civil service is promised on original lines, as also all possible effort for the extension of our merchant marine. A foreign policy is promised on the lines laid down by Washington and generally observed ever since. In short, the president believes that other nations should be allowed to settle their own difficulties, but that the rights of American citizens be preserved at all hazards, and under all conditions. If the President follows out the lines laid down, we shall have a safe, conservative and soundly American administration, under which the country cannot fail to have the fullest possible measure of prosperity.

Wants an Anti-animal Ordinance.

Editor HEADLIGHT:

I notice, in your last issue, that certain citizens of Tillamook have petitioned the city to allow each inhabitant to own and turn loose on the streets, two cows. The council, I think, very properly "sat down" on the proposition. Now, I think it would be in order for the council to pass an ordinance forbidding any cows to run at large at all. We have already an ordinance forbidding the owners of horses allowing them to run on the streets—why, then, this discrimination in favor of cows? One cow will do more damage than two horses and there are about as many poor people dependent on horses for their living as on cows. Let a horse be turned loose to go from his owner's buggy in the road to the stable, and the marshal nab him; let him but stick his head out over the fence and behold, an officer grabs hold of it, hauls him over the fence and into the pound, but cows—they can break down fences, eat up poor men's gardens, frighten women and children, steal half of every load of hay that goes through the streets, and make infernal nuisances of themselves in general, and it's all right. If people want to keep cows in the city, let them tether them out as people do elsewhere, or keep them within fences.

As to the chicken ordinance, I hope it will be passed. If my neighbor wants to keep chickens, let him feed them himself. There is no justice in his having the profit from them and my being compelled to submit to having my property destroyed by them, my garden eaten up and scratched out. Chickens are even worse than cows. A good fence is a safe-guard against cows, but not so with chickens; they can either creep through or, under, or fly over, any ordinary fence, and the person annoyed has no remedy only to kill the offending chickens. This, unfortunately, is a serious offense against the law, and always causes trouble. The only fair thing to do is to pass an ordinance requiring those who desire to indulge in raising chickens to build suitable enclosures for them.
