A correspondent from Hebe writes the following:

This community can congratulate itself on the narrow escape of one of its leading citizens from a watery grave, on Friday evening, the 28th inst. A. T. Bain has a small gill-net which he uses to catch steel-head salmon in Three Rivers. He has a small boat, built on the scow plan, which he uses to set his net and cross the river to some traps which he has set on the opposite side of the river. On the date above mentioned the river was considerably swollen owing to the warm rains, and there being a considerable amount of snow in the mountains, but, however, he decided to set his net, and while doing so espied a raccoon in one of his traps, and being an expert with a boat, he thought nothing of rowing across the river.

He rowed across, secured his cone, and started back; but Three Rivers is a treacherous stream, as hundreds can testify, and in an instant he was being carried with tremendous rapidity down the stream on the crests of the mighty and merciless waves, which he was powerless to resist. Realizing that it was useless to battle with the currents by means of his oars, he seized an overhanging willow by which he meant to help himself out; but no sooner had he seized hold of the limb than the sudden stop of the boat let the water pour in from every side and soon sank the frail craft, leaving the hapless fisherman to get to shore in the best manner possible, which he found a very difficult matter, but finally managed to save himself by getting wet to the skin. He lost his oars, gaff-hook, raccoon and salmon club. He found his boat over a mile down the river the next day, where it had lodged in a drift. We hope this community will not be the scene of any more such adventures.

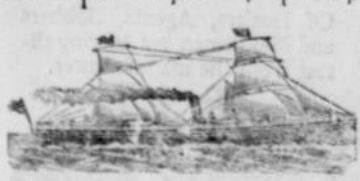

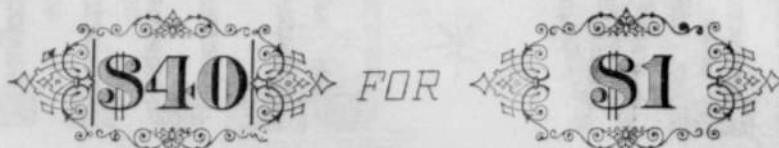
