



I would respectfully ask a little space in your columns to show the tax payers what is being done with 5 mills of taxes in the north end of this county. Last fall there was a road located from a point on the Nelalem River running around Necarney Mt., and as far north as the county line, and ending in the hills where there is no connection with any road: And really on the south end it does connect with any road, but it is simply a piece of road with two ends and no connection nearer than about 1½ miles of a road at the south end. Now what we a road at the south end. Now what we wish to call public attention to, is that all and more than the now esid at tax of District No. I is being spent on this road that is no benefit to the travelling public because it has no connections. If the south end was connected the travelling public could reach the north end of the road, and there have an abrupt shut off.

Why in the name of common sense and for the benefit of the traveling public did they not connect at the south end with some other road, or if they did 2.00 not wish to, then why is the bulk of the tax spent on this isolated road. We are credibly informed that there are other roads that have not been opened 2.00 since the last storm, which occurred about the last of March. We understand that under the present system of roads, that the county court directs the expenditure of the 5 mill road tax. This ba-ing the case it looks queer on the part of C. H. Wheeler as a public spirited, im-partial county father. Mr. Alley tells me that he turned over several hunred feet of lumber to the road upervisor who neglectfully let it wash off in a freshet, and laid other lumber handed from the same landing. We suppose it was on account of Krebs furnishing that which floated away and Wheeler furnishing the other. There was much fault found with MrAlley but he does not have
