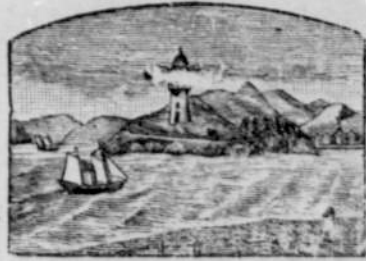

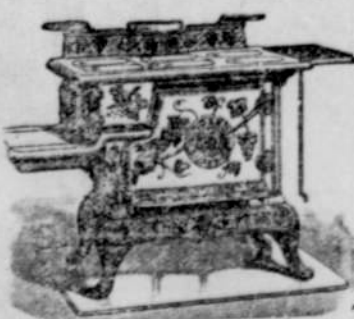

A Man of Importance.

Senator Jones, the Nevada million-aire populist, is cutting a wide swath in tariff politics now. He is the man who secured a duty on hides in the senate bill and got an increase in the tariff on sugar which caused stock in the Sugar Trust to go up 3 1/2 per cent Monday afternoon. It is understood that he is to be allowed his say in pretty much everything in order to hold his vote with the republicans.

Mr. Jones' activity in the tariff discussion calls irresistibly to mind the story told of the distinguished silverite last fall by Mr. David A. Wells. Mr. Jones when he first entered congress, was an ardent free-trader and a sound-money man. He was a close friend of General Grant, and of an honest that he caused the president to veto the green back inflation bill. Mr. Wells says Mr. Jones once remarked to him after the veto that he had made the disastrous consequences of inflation as plain to Grant "as a bull's tail going up hill." Years after ward when Mr. Jones was advocating a high protective tariff and was leading the fight for the coinage of silver, Mr. Wells asked him what had caused such an extraordinary change in his views. In substance he replied: "Why, David, I am the owner of silver mines now, and I want protection for my product. If I had no mines I would be as good a free trader and as strong a gold-standard man as I ever was."

That a man whose convictions are frankly admitted to be swayed so entirely by his personal interests should have been able to "hold up" the nation, and the senate twice in one year on two great heresies—free coinage and protection—is a striking commentary upon the "rotten borough" system. Mr. Jones is a man of great ability, but that the ability which is not directed by conscience is always a source of danger his past and present attitudes are painful illustrations.
