And all for what reason? Simply because some of our Tillamook farmers are either too short sighted or too infernally shiftless to raise hay and potatoes, though they are the easiest raised and most profitable crops that can be grown.

Church, south being held, and, aside from a fraternal despatch, letter or address, there will be little fellowship between the two. The bitterness still existing between the aforementioned branches of the same great church is a standing disgrace to christianity. "By their fruits," (not by empty pretensions) "shall ye know them."

How To Avoid War

They who deprecate vigorous measures for the relief of American citizens in Cuba make much of the danger of war with Spain—not that anybody fears the result, but because even a successful war is costly and bloody, and because Cuba is not worth fighting for. This is true enough. Cuba is not worth fighting for. We do not want the island, and have little confidence in the ability of the insurgents to maintain a strong and orderly government under which domestic industry and foreign trade can prosper.

But the rights of American citizens in a foreign land are worth fighting for, and in the last analysis must be fought for, if we are going to maintain our standing among nations, however costly and bloody the war and however small its immediate fruits. But nations known to be bold and forward to sustain the rights of their citizens abroad rarely have to go to war for that purpose. If such wars come, nations drift into them while trying to shrink their responsibilities. Governments are insulted by foreigners who have a right to think them timid, and are forced into war without preparation by outraged public opinion. Such wars are apt to be doubly disastrous.

The way to avoid war is to be thoroughly prepared for it and go boldly to meet it. The extreme caution and apparent timidity we have shown have been a dangerous provocation to the national insults which make war imperative. Already have we endured, in the murder of Dr. Ruiz, in the outrages of peaceful Americans driven from their homes and herded in garrisoned towns to starve, in prison brutalities and insults to American consuls, offenses which no European nation would bear. The real danger of war is that our paucity of state at all times trustworthy sources of information not subject to intimidation by Spanish mobs. It is not futile yet to employ this most effective means to avert war, and it is to be hoped that it forms part of the president's plan. If we must send money to relieve American victims of Spanish policy, we should send trustworthy agents to oversee its expenditure. Our consuls are not safe, it seems, but our gunboats would not be mobbed.—Oregonian.

Notice to Taxpayers.

The law requires that each male between the ages of 21 and 30 years living within the county shall pay a poll tax of one dollar (\$1) at the time of assessment, and if not so paid, to be reported to the sheriff of the county, with added costs, for collection, at once. The law allows no exemption for poll tax, except to active members of the Oregon National Guard, and all active firemen who have been members of any company, for one year next preceding the time of assessment, and exempt firemen. That there may be no cause for complaint I ask that each person liable to poll tax be prepared to pay the same to the assessor, or his deputy, at the time of making the assessment. I ask the aid of every person in the county, that the law may be strictly complied with. Persons exempt will be required to show their certificate of exemption.
