I shall be engaged this summer in investigating the bays of the Oregon coast to determine their adaptability to the propagation of the eastern oyster.

I do not know how favorably conditioned Tillamook Bay is in this direction, but I should much like to correspond with wide awake, reliable parties there (preferably those who have had some experience in oyster culture or in the east) for the purpose of ascertaining their views in this connection. If conditions appear favorable I shall try to visit your locality during the summer.

Terrible Accident.

One of the saddest accidents that has occurred in Tillamook for years happened at Frank Severance's Logging Camp, on the Miami on Tuesday. For some time Mr. Severance has had in his employ a man named Gus Wells. At about 4:30 p. m. on Tuesday some of the men in the crew were engaged in moving a large log which lay with one end against a stump at the top of a small hill, down which it was necessary to roll it to place it in reach of the teamsters. All the men had been warned to keep out of the way, and when the log was just about to be released another warning was given. The log was then pushed clear of the stump and started quickly rolling down the hill. Wells, who had been working near the screw men, and in a position in which there was not the least danger, he being about 20 feet from the end of the log and on a level with the shoulder of the hill, immediately in front of the log, which passed over his legs and body finally resting on his head. Of course he was instantly killed as the log which passed over him was of large size and going down hill at terrific speed. The reason for the man's action it is impossible to give. Most people believe that the man became terrified, and did not know what to do, and accidentally jumped in front of the log.

Wells was a quiet unassuming sort of a man about 40 years of age, and a native of Illinois. He lived on the Trask about 12 miles from this city on a homestead and was a married man with a family of three children most of whom are small and unable to provide for themselves. The body was brought up by boat yesterday and will be buried on the family homestead.
