Beet Sugar No Longer An Experiment.

Results already achieved in field and factory on a commercial scale during the past six years, to say nothing of many thousands of farm and laboratory tests, demonstrate beyond question two things: (1) That the sugar beet can be grown in profitable quantity and quality over a sufficient area in the United States to furnish the world's supply of sugar, and (2) that the cane-sugar industry can also be largely developed. So true is this that it is now recognized, by all well informed about this new industry, that California, Iowa, Nebraska, and any one of several other states could alone supply the United States with all the sugar she consumes. Once established, American genius will improve upon present conditions that in due time the United States will be an exporter of sugar. For experience has shown that, once established, the beet can more than compete with cane.—From "Sugar—the American Question of the Day," by Herbert Myrick, in June Review of Reviews.
