Lincoln As A Lawyer

A story has often been printed telling how Lincoln fooled the court, jury and opposing attorneys with an almanac, in the celebrated Armstrong murder case. A witness for the prosecution had testified that he saw the defendant, Armstrong, strike the fatal blow; that it occurred about 11 o'clock at night, and the moon was shining brightly. Lincoln, who was defending Armstrong, introduced in evidence an almanac, and showed conclusively that the killing occurred in the dark of the moon. The story is that this almanac was of the year previous to the murder, and it has been made to appear that Lincoln, who then stood high in his profession, whose name was a synonym for integrity, and who was even then known as "Honest Abe" resorted to this low, pettifogging trick in order to clear his client. And this trial occurred but two years before he was nominated for the Presidency. This story, which has appeared in several biographies of Lincoln, and has been a hard "pill" to swallow by the admirers of his noble character, is now emphatically denied so far as the deception is concerned, by an attorney, who was present at the trial, and saw the almanac introduced, and its date questioned and verified by opposing counsel.

Another almanac for the same year was even sent for, and compared with the one introduced by Lincoln, and the two were found to agree. There was always a strong improbability of truth on the face of this anecdote, because it was a reflection upon the shrewdness of the opposing attorneys, and the court and jury, in a hotly contested case, and was altogether inconsistent with the known character of Lincoln, who never strove to gain success at the bar by any other means than by his natural ability, industry and integrity. In the circuit where he practiced judges had so much confidence in him that his statement of the law was usually unquestioned, and the burden was cast upon the opposing attorney of producing printed authority against it, otherwise it would be accepted by the court as law.

The correction of this story was recently made by Mr. A. Bergen, of Topeka, Kansas, in a paper read before the Kansas State Bar Association. It is due to the bar that the correction be made, as it is certainly harmful to the profession that the impression should be cultivated that success therein can ever be based upon fraud or trickery. Lawyers are at once the most abused and most trusted of mankind, but the large majority of the profession believe in, and practice honesty, and they rely for success upon work and character, and not upon pettifogging and deception.
