In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Tillamook. Richard Niles vs Receiver of the Portland Savings Bank. Plaintiff vs. W. S. Runyon, James Steel, S. W. Her, S. V. Anderson, Edward Evans and Eliza F. Evans his wife, Mary Hughes, and Lewis Prager, Heirs of the late M. Prager, and William Prager, partners, defendants.

To the above named W.S. Runyon, defendant. In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby notified and required to appear in the above entitled court on or before the first day of the next regular term of said court, to wit: the fourth Monday of August next, being the twenty-third day of August, A. D. 1897, and answer the plaintiff's complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit and if you fail so to appear and answer for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief demanded in said complaint.

The relief demanded in the complaint herein is as follows: First: For the reformation of a certain deed from the defendants Edward Evans, and Eliza F. Evans, his wife, to the defendant, W. S. Runyon, to a portion of the real property hereinafter described.

Second: For the recovery by plaintiff from the defendants W. S. Runyon and James Steel, of the sum of forty-four thousand three hundred and thirty-six dollars, with interest thereon at the rate of eight per cent per annum from the 23d day of February, 1894, all in U. S. gold coin, and the further sum of five thousand dollars, attorneys fees, together with his costs and disbursements herein, all on account of a certain promissory note made and delivered by the defendant W. S. Runyon to the defendant James Steel and endorsed by said defendant James Steel to the Portland Savings Bank, and dated February 23, 1893, and being for said sum of \$44,336, with interest thereon after maturity at the rate of eight per cent per annum, said note being due in one year.

Third: For the foreclosure of a certain mortgage, executed and delivered by the defendant W. S. Runyon to the defendant James Steel to secure the payment of said promissory note, upon the following described real property situated in the County of Tillamook and State of Oregon, to wit:
