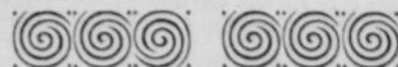

GENERAL NEWS.

CLEANED FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD Conveyed in Short and Pithy Paragraphs.

WASHINGTON, July 7.—By decisive vote of 38 to 23, the tariff bill was passed in the Senate shortly before 5 o'clock to day.

By 4:00 o'clock the senators began to manifest their impatience by calls for "vote, vote," and thereafter the last amendment was disposed of and the final vote began. There were many interruptions as pairs were arranged, and when, at 4:55 o'clock the vice president rose and announced the passage of the bill—aye, 38; noes, 23.

An analysis of the final vote shows that the affirmative was cast by 35 republicans, two silver republicans (Jones of Nevada and Mantle) and one democrat (McEnery). The negative vote was cast by 25 democrats, two populists (Harris of Kansas and Turner) and one silver republican (Cannon).

Eight republicans were paired for the bill and eight democrats against it. The first-named would have voted for the bill, and the last named against it: Aldrich and Murphy, Chandler and McLaurin, Frye and Gorman, Gear and Smith, Hansbrough and Daniel, Hear and Harris of Tennessee, Thurston and Allen, Wolcott and George.

LONDON, July 7.—Greece-Turkish affairs seem to be re-entering an interesting stage. The porte dispatched a circular to its representatives abroad, containing a skillful defense of the Turkish case, and declining to consider any frontier line in Thessaly north of the river Penios, which is regarded as its natural boundary.

On Monday the sultan summoned a council of ministers for an extraordinary sitting to the Yekidiz kiosk, with the result that, after a heated discussion, a report was drawn up in favor of resuming hostilities if peace should not be concluded within a day. The minister of war sent telegrams to Edhem Pasha, announcing the decision.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—The long-anticipated "California '97" of the Christian Endeavorers became a reality with the assembling of the two vast audiences at the Mechanic's and Woodwards pavilions this morning. Ten thousand people filled the Mechanic's pavilion as early as 9:30 this morning, and crowds of delegates were turned away, no room being left for them on the inside. The hall was a vast bouquet of colors. All was animated and happiness, with the thousands eager to applaud or cheer at every opportunity.

The formal opening was by Rev. F. E. Clark, the founder and president of the great Christian Endeavor movement. Dr. Clark was received with frenzied applause by every person in the building. Every man, woman and child stood up on benches and chairs waving aloft flags, banners, handkerchiefs—in fact, every conceivable object to be had. The demonstration lasted several minutes, and Dr. Clark appeared much affected by the heartiness of the welcome.

The meeting at Woodward's pavilion, while not so large, owing to the smaller capacity of the building, was equally enthusiastic. The hall was crowded and hundreds blocked the streets on the outside. Secretary Willis Baer formally opened the convention at this morning.
