##### Nehalem

(From the Nehalem Times.)

The schooner Berwick arrived Friday from San Francisco. She will load lumber.

The Maggie went around to Tillamook bay Friday to tow a raft of logs down the bay for the Truckee mill.

Miss Mattie Thompson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. Thompson, arrived here Friday and will hereafter be a resident of our little city.

A gentleman from Portland arrived here last week with a logging outfit and expects to log the Kelbe timber. He will use four teams of horses and will employ about 20 men.

Elw. G. E. Wist returned Sunday evening from Astoria and Portland via North Yamhill and Tillamook. He expects the steamer in a day or so with his chinamen and supplies for the cannery.

##### Woods

(FROM THE OCEAN WAVE)

A. E. Lucy made a trip to Tillamook this week bringing back a load of freight. It was reported that the Siletz cannery was to have started canning salmon last Thursday.

Louis and Otis Farmer and quite a number of others from the Sand Lake country are fishing here.

It is reported that Capt. Crim, of Salmon river, is talking quite favorably of organizing a co-operative company and building a steam schooner and start for the gold region of the Yukon in the spring. The proposition is, that 20 men with \$500 each shall constitute the company. Quite a number of the farmers in the Little Nestucca country are wild to take the trip. Among them are Messrs Commons, Rock, Meyers, Plank and others.

Last Sunday while Frank Miles and Charlie Murphy, two boys of this place, were coming from the Siletz Indian Reservation they noticed a very small steamer, with one mast, sailing northward; after reaching a point opposite the mouth of the Nestucca river it turned around going back in the direction from which it came. The steamer was painted black and was near shore, probably seeking some landing along this part of the country. It is a common thing to see

steamers and schooners pass, but when a craft of this kind, acting as this one did it creates suspicion.
