Flax Culture in Tillamook.

We give, below, some correspondence relating to flax culture in this and adjoining counties. Messrs. Foard and Stokes of Astoria Ore. it will be remembered received a large consignment of flax seed from a firm in Lisburn Ireland which seed was to be distributed and sown here and samples of the product sent to them. Some of this flax seed was sown broadcast and some in drills. The following letter from Mr. Porter of Lisburn Ireland has reference only to the drilled flax sown in this County. The letter from Foard and Stokes to Messrs. Cohn & Co. refers to that grown here and which was sown broadcast.

Astoria, Ore., Aug. 17th '97 Cohn & Co., Tillamook, Oregon. Gentlemen:

In response to your letter of Aug. 14th, will say we have received the samples of Flax, and are very much obliged for them. We shall ship them as stated in your former letter to Lisburn, Ireland. We believe that some of your samples are very nice. The thiner kind of which there are two or three lots, the coarser is too heavy.

Enclosed please find copy of report of former samples, which we have sent. You will notice that the thinner flax is better, this of course simply lies in the culture of the same, as the coarser flax has been sown too thickly.

It will probably be some time before we make another shipment and if you have any more you wish to send, please send it, as it will be greatly appreciated by us. Respectfully Yours, Foard & Stokes Company, Lisburn, Ireland, Aug. 14th, 1897. Messrs. Foard & Stokes Co., Astoria, Oregon. Gentlemen:

I am in receipt of yours of the 14th & 16th ult., notifying that you had forwarded to me samples of Flax plant No. 8 & 9. I am very much disappointed in these two samples. The flax has grown long, strong and what we would call rank. I have very grave fears regarding the prospects of getting any quality from these plants. To begin with there are too many double and treble plants, that is to say, the plants have grown in two or three shoots from the root, thus weakening the original plant, and consequently there are too many branches at the top of the plant. Both of these are serious faults, as the top branches will break off in the sheathing and the lower shoots at the root will also deteriorate the value of the fibre very much.

You never told me whether you propose having the flax rotted, that is steeped in your district, or if you will forward the plant to me pressed and packed. It will be time enough coming by sailing ship and do not think of putting on the expense of forwarding over-land. If any of my brother's vessels are in your neighborhood I feel certain they will bring the lot home for you free. Mention the matter to the Captain and ask them to bring forward whatever you have, in live good form, in quantities, which they will receive from my brother on arrival. I shall as soon as I receive the fibre from you, proceed to make it into salmon twine if possible for your market.
