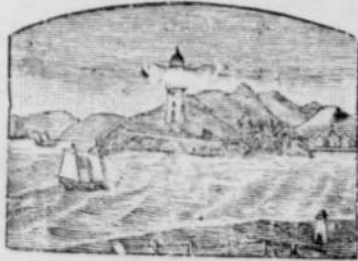

GENERAL NEWS.

CLEANED FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD.

Conveyed in Short and Pithy
Paragraphs.

SEATTLE, Aug. 22.—According to the
decision of W. J. Bryant and C. D. Cher-
ry, United States local inspectors of
of steam vessels for the Puget Sound dis-
trict, constituting a marine court of in-
quiry, Capt. H. C. Thomas, master, is
responsible for the loss of the steamship
Mexico, which ran on to West Devil
rock, Dixon's Entrance, Alaska, on Aug
5 h, and was sunk in 500 feet of water.
The marine tribunal did not mince mat-
ters, but declared in the decision given
out today that Captain Thomas not only
could have prevented the loss of the ship
after he struck the rock, but that he was
also derelict in duty in having retired at
the hour he did, especially considering
the location of the steamer. Pilot Con-
nall does not escape censure, and his
punishment in the premises consists of
the suspension of his pilot's license. Cap-
tain Thomas had his pilot license revoked—
taken from him outright—and his
master's license suspended for thirty
days. The inspectors announced their
decision this morning, soon after the re-
ceipt of a telegram from Goodall, Perkins
& Co., requesting permission for Capt.
Thomas to assume command of the
Williamette, presumably on her return
from Alaska.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—There was a
pause in the downward movement of
wheat prices today, at the lowest point
of the season there was a rise of 4 cents a
bushel from yesterday's close, but this
was still 3½ cents under the highest
figure of the year on December.
The market started out with the bulls
in control, and a spirited competition for
wheat between local shorts and continen-
tal houses. Prices ran up to 98 cts
on this bulge against 95½ cents last
night, but on a succeeding cloud of sell-
ing orders in realizing and for short ac-
count slipped to 96½ cents, from which
it rose steadily, reached 99½ cents in
the early afternoon on good all-around
buying, led by Chicago.

MONTEVIDEO, Aug. 25. During the
national lute here today President Borda
was shot and killed by an assassin.

dondo.
President Borda died almost immedi-
ately after he was shot.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 25.—Representa-
tives of all the coal operators in the
Pittsburg district met this morning to
devise ways and means for opening the
mines immediately at all hazards. After
the meeting the operators said the
entire session had been taken up with
discussion on the following resolution
which was adopted:
"Inasmuch as the efforts we have made
to bring the strike to an end have failed;
therefore be it
"Resolved, That we have no course
left open but to continue the struggle
along the lines that may appear most pro-
ductive of the results desired in the in-
terests of the miners and operators alike."
"Resolved, That we discharge all com-
mittees and adjourn sine die."

It is said that the operators will now
prepare to open their mines. Notices
will be posted notifying the strikers that
they can return to work if they care to.
After sufficient time has elapsed and the
men do not return, the operators will
engage employees from other places and
start their mines.
SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 25.—The steamer
shidai-Ki, which arrived in port this morn-
ing from Skagway and Dyce, brought the fol-
lowing letters for the Associated Press:
"Skagway, near Dyce, Alaska, Aug. 4.—Twelve
Canadian customs officers have arrived here,
and in a few days will establish a custom-house
at the portage between Lake Bennett and Tagish
lake, a point by which all Yukon or Klondike
travelers must pass if they start from Dyce or
Skagway. The rate of duty will average about
50 on the average outfit of a Yukoner."

NELSONVILLE O., Aug. 29.—The des-
tination among miners here is very great.
Manager Berkley says 1200 persons, the
entire mining population of the town,
have absolutely nothing to eat, and 100
of these are sick. It is thought in the
vicinity that there are 1200 destitute
people, a large number of whom are
children. Local charity has helped them
till its means are gone. A citizen's com-
mittee is exerting itself to secure tem-
porary relief by tomorrow. If outside
help does not come soon, the consequences
will be appalling.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—A special
from Washington says:
Instructions have been issued by the
late department to Luther Osborn, of
Nebraska, the new consul-general to
Asia, Samoa, which will form the basis
of the restoration of the influence of this
country in the Samoan islands.

PORT ANGELES, Wash., Aug. 28.—
The steamer Portland arrived from St.
Michaels tonight. Captain Kidston re-
ported a pleasant voyage, and explained
the delay of three days in reaching Port
Angeles by stating that a very serious
storm at St. Michaels delayed the dis-
charge of his cargo.

He laughed when told of the reports
that the Portland was carrying over \$2,
000,000 in gold. As a matter of fact, he
said, there was only about \$825,000 in
gold dust and nuggets on board his ves-
sel. Up to the time he left St. Michaels
he had heard of no new gold fields.
