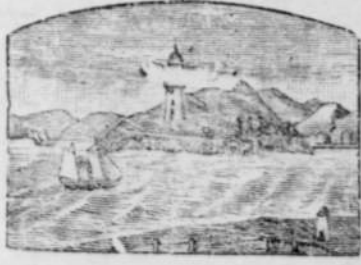

GENERAL NEWS.

CLEANED FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD.  
Conveyed in Short and Pithy  
Paragraphs.

NELVILLE O., Aug. 29.—The destitution among miners here is very great. Manager Berkley says 1200 persons, the entire mining population of the town, have absolutely nothing to eat, and 100 of these are sick. It is thought in the vicinity that there are 1200 destitute people, a large number of whom are children. Local charity has helped them till its means are gone. A citizen's committee is exerting itself to secure temporary relief by tomorrow. If outside help does not come soon, the consequences will be appalling.

NEW YORK Sept. 3.—R. G. Dun & Company's weekly review of trade will say tomorrow:  
Failures during August were not only 17 per cent less than in August, 1896, but in amount of liabilities, 70.8 smaller. July and August show a smaller average of liabilities per failure than have ever been known in any year or even in a quarter of the 23 years R. G. Dun & Co. have kept quarterly records. The improvement is also well distributed, extending to nearly every important branch of business, but in clothing, jewelry and unclassified trading only two months of the past 47 have shown smaller failures; in general stores and furniture only three; in groceries, hats and iron manufactures only four; in chemical manufactures only five, and in clothing manufactures only six months of the 47. The ratio of defaulted liabilities to payments at clearing-houses has been smaller in July and August than in any month since early in 1893.

OAKLAND, Cal., Sept. 3.—Judge Eli Worth has ruled that a bicycle is personal property and exempt from execution if used by the owner in his daily business.

COLUMBUS, O., Sept. 3.—The end of the great miners' strike is in sight. This afternoon the national executive board of the United Mine-workers' Association agreed to recommend to the miners a proposition from the pittsburg operators for a straight price of 65 cents a ton, to continue in force until the end of the year, with the additional mutual understanding that a joint meeting of operators and miners shall be held in December, 1897, for the purpose of determining what the rate of mining shall be thereafter.

A delegation convention of all miners who have suspended work has been called to meet in Columbus September 8, at A. M., to act upon recommendation. President Hatchford and the other members of the board say there is not the slightest doubt but that the miners will approve the recommendation. The proposition does not involve arbitration, and it provides for an immediate settlement of the strike.

As soon as the miners ratify the proposition work will be resumed in all the mines.

Portland, Or., Sept.—An effort was made to pick hops in a few of the yards in Oregon yesterday, but the work was retarded by the wet weather, and in some sections, by a scarcity of pickers. The growers still try to keep a stiff upper lip, but the tenor of the reports indicate that the hop crop in Oregon has already been damaged enough to make it fall short at least 25 per cent of the average yield.

PORTLAND, Sept. 5.—The Oregon congressional delegation yesterday agreed upon the following recommendation for appointment to federal offices in Oregon:  
United States district attorney—John Hall, of Portland.  
United States marshal—Zoeth Houser, of Umatilla county.  
Appraiser of customs, Willamette district, at Portland—Colonel Owen Summers, of Portland.  
Register of United States land office at Oregon City—T. T. Geer, of Marion county.

PORT TOWNSEND, Sept. 6.—The steamer Eugene, which started from the Willamette river to Dawson City, by way of St. Michaels, in tow of the st. Bristol, began to break up, and had to be deserted by the Bristol. The Eugene is now lying in Alert bay, in a badly damaged condition, her house being nearly demolished.

Town Council meeting.  
City Council called to order at the usual hour by Recorder Drew. On motion C. E. Reynolds was made chairman pro tem. Roll call found Hadley, Thompson and R. Reynolds, councilmen and the marshal and recorder present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved as read. The first and about all of the business was the presenting of bills as follows:

The above bills were allowed and warrants ordered drawn to pay the same.

The bill of E. E. Page, by judgment of the circuit court for the sum of \$35.60 and the bill of Geo. H. Handley, by judgment of Circuit court for the sum of \$58.50 were ordered paid by warrants being drawn upon approval of the bills of the city attorney.

G. O. Nolan as committee from the fire company presents a bill in the sum of \$15.00 for the light in front of City Hall charged to the fire company. The bill was not entertained.

Must Pay Tuition  
Children from outside school districts will be requested to pay tuition fees if they desire to attend the city school during the coming winter. The rates have been established by the directors as follows: \$3.00, \$3.50, \$4.00 and \$5.00 according to the grade. This step was taken by the directors as a matter of necessity as the school is already overcrowded, and it has become quite a practice for people to take advantage of the city school in winter instead of levying a special school tax to support their public schools in their own districts.  
It is quite possible that some fault will be found by some people with the action of the directors in this matter, but if the matter is looked at fairly the reasonableness of their action will at once become apparent.
