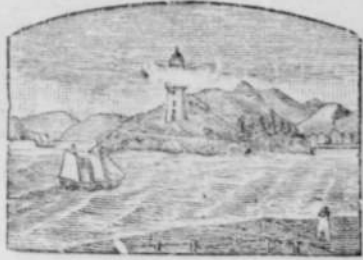

### GENERAL NEWS.

#### CLEANED FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD.

#### Conveyed in Short and Pithy Paragraphs.

The yellow fever is gradually spreading along the gulf coast states. New Orleans, Jackson, Mobile and other places report the fever on the increase.

Seth Low will be the candidate for Mayor of New York City.

A new series of postage stamps is to be issued soon. They will be green in color.

The famous Craven-Fair Will case in San Francisco was decided in favor of the Fair estate.

Dr. Andrews has withdrawn his resignation and will retain the presidency of Brown University.

The Str. Excelsior has arrived from St. Michaels with about \$300,000. in Klondike gold on board.

The New York Democrats repudiate the Chicago platform.

Postmaster-General Gary has become convinced of the wisdom and utility of postal savings institutions and has decided to have a bill prepared providing for their establishment and to recommend its passage by congress.

A special to the Herald from Panama Columbia, says:

Guatemala now faces an uprising far more serious than the one of a few months ago, telegraphs the Herald correspondent in the city of Guatemala. The present rebellion is led by men of great wealth and influence, and is slightly gaining in strength each day.

The German Emperor is accused of having used a large amount of money not his own, and squandered it in personal extravagance. The money was known as the Guelph fund.

The entire board of Supervisors in San Francisco has been removed by the edict of Superior Judge Wallace, and their successors have been appointed by Gov. Budd.

George Mederia, the well-known mining expert, who has been making a careful examination of the Coffee creek district, in Trinity county has sent a report to Secretary Durlan, of the State Mining bureau. He says that the value of the recent finds of that section has been greatly exaggerated. Gold can be panned from surface dirt only in small quantities, paying from 25 to 30 cts a pan. Any large strike that may be made there in the future will accrue to the benefit of those having plenty of capital to buy machinery and properly work claims.

Sumas, the terminus of the Seattle & International railroad, at the Canadian border, is in a condition of wild excitement over the reports that are brought in from a newly discovered quartz district eight miles south of the international boundary line, northeast of Mount Baker, and 45 miles from Sumas. Samples of free-milling ore brought to this city for assay run as high as \$10,000. in gold to the ton. The infection is spreading, and parties in this city are preparing to leave tomorrow for Mount Baker. Mining experts in Seattle say they believe the reports, and that the discoveries are in a district that is simply a continuation of the Okanagan, Metho, Slate creek, and Ruby creek districts, across the northern tier of counties in the state. Sumas is practically depopulated, and every man who can get an outfit and horse is leaving for the mines. If the reports are confirmed there will likely be great excitement, as the mines can be reached and worked all the year round, good roads and trails leading to within 4 miles of the new mines.

T. T. Geer has positively declined to be Register of the U. S. Land Office at Oregon City. His views of the matter and his reasons for declining are tersely and forcibly given in the following letter addressed to Senator McBride:

McClay, Or., Sept. 15, 1897.—To Senator McBride and Representatives W. S. Mills and T. H. Tongue—Gentlemen: Regarding your recommendation for my appointment as Register of the United States Land Office at Oregon City, I beg leave to say that extended reflection has only served to confirm my first conclusion, not to accept the appointment, if made.

There are two controlling reasons which impel me to this decision, the first of which is that I have never been a candidate, in any sense for the position for which I was recommended as an examination of the personal letters and petitions in my behalf will surely show; and for further reasons that several months ago I joined in recommending a personal friend for the Oregon City office—a bar to my acceptance of it which I cannot persuade myself to overlook.

I dislike very much to be considered a miscellaneous candidate for any position on the political chessboard that may be parceled

out to me by those having the "placing" of the men. I had, and still have, what I regard as a laudable ambition to be collector of customs for this district; but it, in your judgment, the best interests of the public service and of the republican party (and of course in a case like this we are not influenced by any other considerations) demand that this request of myself and friends be denied, then I bow as gracefully as possible to your decision, but must insist on my privilege of declining to be a candidate for any other appointment.

It goes without saying, gentlemen, that my attachment to the republican party is supported by unshaken ardor; for, in my judgement, there has been no time in its history when it was more nearly right on public questions than now, and the years to come will, I am sure, find us, as heretofore, battling side by side for the success of the principles we love so well.

#### NOTICE

A great many people are under the impression that the county court must keep printed notices on bridges warning the public that it is unlawful to ride or drive over such bridges at a greater speed than a walk. This is not the case, but it appearing that it is the practice of quite a number of our citizens to ride and drive over the bridges of the county at an unlawful rate of speed, I will cite them to the following section of the Oregon Statute that they may take warning and keep out of trouble.

Sec. 1722 reads as follows:

If any person shall willfully ride or drive over any public bridge within this state at a greater speed than a walk, or shall drive at any one time more than 25 head of cattle, horses or mules over any such bridge, such person upon conviction thereof before any justice of the peace or other court of competent jurisdiction, shall be punished by a fine not less than ten, nor more than one hundred dollars.
