All academic grades, except the highest grade, \$4.00 per term. Highest academic grade, \$5.00 per term. The musical department will be under the personal direction of an able and accomplished musician who will give instructions upon the piano, organ, guitar, mandolin, violin and banjo. Rates of tuition \$10 per term of eleven weeks.

In the department of domestic economy special attention will be given young ladies in plain and fancy needle work. All students expecting to attend are urgently requested to be present on the day that the school opens.
