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The quarantine against Mr. Bryan is still rigorously maintained in Ohio, Maryland, New York, and all other states where the Democrats think they have any show of success.

The calamity howlers should take off their smoked glasses and look around. They will find that the factory smoke in the sky will protect their orbs from the too dazzling beams of the McKinley prosperity.

It is about the time of year for "Professor" Wilson to make another "explanation" on the interesting question of tariff bills. He probably has not yet had time to examine the workings of the Dingley bill, nor to compare it with his own effort in that line.

Have the gold bugs captured Colorado? That state, it is now announced, will add \$20,000,000 to the gold of the country this year from her own mines, and it is probable that the total gold production of the world in 1897 will aggregate \$250,000,000, a sum vastly greater than is needed to keep pace with the growth of population and business of the world.

The rapid decadence of the free-coinage craze is shown by the fact that its chief defender, Mr. Bryan, is rigorously excluded from the states where this fall's campaign is considered of serious importance. In Ohio, Maryland, New York, and other states where there is a real contest he has been given to understand that he is not wanted, and other free-silver shouters are also barred.

A South American physician, Dr. Sarnalli, claims to have discovered a serum wherewith to inoculate persons as a protection against Yellow fever. The doctor has given years of patient study to a discovery of the bacilli of Yellow fever and the preventive serum and is confident that he has made the discovery. Should his claims prove to be well founded his name will be handed down to future generations as one of the benefactors of earth.

Spain has exchanged Butcher Weyler for Marshal Campos as Governor-General of Cuba, but it does not yet appear that she has exchanged the cruel policy, which she has hitherto pursued toward Cuba, for something more humane. Butcher Weyler was no more offensive to the Cubans and the friends of liberty everywhere than will be Butcher Campos if he pursues the same policy. The general sentiment at Washington seems to be that Spain must either change her policy or face the consequences.

The fight for better transportation facilities goes merrily on. The chamber of commerce in Portland has accumulated enough evidence against the present management to convince it that unless the matter be attended to at once the result will be that Portland will lose the Tillamook trade altogether. The HEADLIGHT feels certain from assurances given by the chamber of commerce that arrangements will soon be made for a satisfactory service.

The Austrian government has demanded from Secretary Sherman the facts concerning the Lattimer riot and shooting of Austrian subjects. Whatever the facts may be in the matter we would respectfully suggest that one way of preventing the recur-

ence of difficulties of that kind is to prevent any more of that class of immigrants coming here. It is the glut of the labor market by the importation of that class of laborers, more than anything else that makes oppression by unscrupulous employers possible and that leads to consequences such as the unfortunate occurrence at Lattimer.

Protection means increased manufactures at home. Increased manufactures mean increased employment. Increased employment means increased earnings.

Increased earnings means increased consumption.

Increased consumption means increased demand for articles consumed.

Increased demand for articles consumed means increased prices. Do you understand how it is that all articles which the farmers have to sell have advanced in price? Reports from Ohio show that the Democrats have absolutely abandoned the silver issue. Aside from the opening speech of Mr. Chapman, their candidate for Governor, no Democratic orator has opened his lips on the silver question, and those who attempted or proposed to do so were promptly deported from the state by the chairman of the party. When it is considered that the Democratic platform adopted in that state only ninety days ago discussing nothing but silver, the rapidity of the change which has come over the public mind under the prosperity following the enactment of the protective tariff is phenomenal.

J. V. Huntsinger, the father of Fred Huntsinger, who was arrested here by a fool sheriff from South Dakota on a charge of manslaughter was in town on Saturday to raise money to bring his son back from Dakota where he had been taken for trial. Young Huntsinger writes that the trial occupied four days and resulted in his complete exoneration. The Dakota sheriff who took him from here promised to see that expenses were paid if acquitted, but he failed to keep his promise, and the father had to mortgage his little all to bring his son back. The county in which Huntsinger was tried had to put about \$500 to \$1000 expenses—and all for the benefit of a damphool sheriff who wanted to see the wild and woolly west at the public expense.

We fancy that no one in the United States, unless he be a spoilsman pure and simple, is displeased that President McKinley has asked Consul General Fitzhugh Lee to remain in his position at Havana, nor that Gen. Lee has accepted the proffer in the spirit in which it was tendered.

Gen. Lee has proved himself the right man in the right place. He is thoroughly conversant with the situation in Cuba, believes the revolution must necessarily succeed, and that the continuance of the war is a waste of Spanish resources and a bloody and useless sacrifice of life and of the material resources of Cuba.

More than this, he has sturdily maintained the honor of the United States and the rights of our citizens in Cuba. He has kept a firm hand in the way of restraint upon Weyler and his tyrannical underlings. He has never hesitated to perform his full duty as an American, and the official representative of this country.

The request of the President that he shall remain at his post of duty means not only that his worth is recognized, but it also affords an indication of the policy of the administration toward Cuban affairs. It fits in with the mission of Gen. Woodford to Madrid, as far as the latter is made public, and shows that matters are no longer to be allowed to drift.
