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The bank of England is becoming alarmed at the outflow of gold from its coffers to this country, and various measures are being attempted to stop it. But it still continues to come.

It is about time that candidates for the different offices in this city step forward and declare their intentions. Thus far not a single one has announced himself. It looks as though every body was so well satisfied with the city government that no one desires any change.

The Philadelphia Record says that the Dingley law comes thundering down the line in the second month of its operation, with a deficit of three and a half million dollars. What a noise there must have been in the second month of the Wilson law, when the deficit was thirteen and a half million!

Mr. Pullman, of palace car fame is dead. As a man of business he was eminently successful in life, having accumulated about \$40,000,000. Except by the veriest radicals amongst the labor organizations he was looked upon as a model employer of labor and a model man.

The leaders of the calamity party are overjoyed at the slight fall in wheat lately. They are expectantly watching quotations, in hopes that something will conduce to a further depreciation of its value, so that they can say 'We told you so' to the farmers. The fact that an ounce of silver a year ago was equal in value to a bushel of wheat, but now buys only half a bushel, has knocked the wind out of their specious arguments.

The death of Chas. A. Dana, editor of the New York Journal, removes from the journalistic field its greatest man. Mr. Dana was a man of profound convictions and undaunted courage, and the Sun under his editorial supervision became editorially the strongest of all the great New York dailies. Mr. Dana was sometimes wrong, (and who is not) but he was always conscientious and his newspaper was a powerful influence throughout the nation.

Gen. Booth, of Salvation Army fame, has gone to Berlin, Germany to begin a campaign which he hopes may result in the conversion of the Emperor William. It is to be hoped that he may succeed. He could hardly make a bigger fool of the "Divine Billy" than he already is and any change, therefore would be for the better. But much more than the conversion of William is it probable that Gen. Booth may run foul of Emperor William's "lese majesty" laws and find himself speedily sent to prison.

The rescue of Evangelina Cisneros from the horrors of a Spanish prison into which she was cast because she would not submit to the lustful wiles of a provincial Spanish Governor has been attracting much attention of late in the press of the country. To the San Francisco Examiner and the New York Journal belongs the credit of doing the work, and though the deed was clearly contrary to law it was morally right and will reflect great credit on those enterprising journals in the estimation of the American people.

The business men of the country are again exerting themselves in those states where the silver issue has come into prominence in the

fall's campaign. The remarkable aligning of the business forces of the country against the campaign of anarchy and repudiation of last year showed that business men were fully alive to the death blow which was being aimed at them by the Bryanites, and their present activity in certain States attests that they are determined to lead their active efforts to campaigns as long as there is any vitality left in the free silver fallacy.

The appropriation recommended for Tillamook buy this year amounts to \$52000. The amount is none too large and it is to be sincerely hoped that the entire amount may be secured.

A couple of months ago the free traders looked complacently at the large exportations of manufactures under the Wilson law, and were only waiting to point exultingly to the falling off of these exportations under the new law. It seems, however, that they were wrong, as usual. The first month of the operations of the Dingley law showed a larger exportation of manufactured articles than for any corresponding month of preceding years. So much for their statements that the enactment of a protective revenue law would cut off our market abroad for American manufactures.

The statement of Comptroller Eckels, of the United States Treasury, in regard to business improvement throughout the country is very encouraging. He states that "the improvement has come rapidly and permeates all lines of industry. It began with the agricultural class. The farmers have large crops and are getting good prices for them. The cattle-raisers are benefited by a substantial raise in the price of cattle. This improvement in agricultural earnings has had its effect on the railroads by increasing their earnings. It has put money into circulation and enabled people to pay off their debts, and has thereby benefited the merchants."

The unreasonable exactions of our present transportation company are having a very bad effect on the immigration of people to this county. Tillamook county has thousands of acres of good land awaiting settlement and clearing up and there is a large area of good land awaiting the pioneer's ax. But so long as intending settlers know that they will be compelled to pay such enormous rates of transportation it will be hard to induce them in this direction. One gentleman, who came here 4 years ago, informed the editor that the freight of his goods from Albany to Astoria was just \$5.00. From Astoria to Tillamook the freight on the same goods was \$65.00

The political pot will soon begin to boil and the candidates for official position will be on the anxious seat. All the political factions here thus far, are asleep and the sky is serene. Whether it be the sleep that knows no waking or that they are simply waiting to measure each other's strength remains to be seen. It is to be sincerely hoped that the former is true and that all former difficulties will be forgotten in the general determination to carry the entire state for the party which has redeemed the country from bankruptcy and ruin and to which Oregon owes so much. Men are nothing, factions are nothing, but the general good of the party is everything.

What were some of those remarks that were heralded around from Popocratic stump to stump last year, to the effect that our currency was so limited and contracted that we could not do business, and that the only hope for prosperity was through the free coinage of silver at 16 to 1. It is quite evident to observant men that some of these Popocrats were laboring under a mistake, because

by reference to the election returns of 1896 it will be seen that the free coinage proposition was not adopted, and yet here we find in the country to-day nearly a hundred million dollars more in circulation than there was a year ago, and not a dollar of free silver. Gold alone has increased in circulation in the last year over fifty million dollars.

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
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
