HE WANTS TO KNOW.

Our Milpitas Correspondent Asks Questions.

Milpitas, Cal., Nov. 2, 1887.

Editor Headlight.—I write to find out a few things regarding Tillamook. I received a bundle of Headlights, some descriptive circulars written by Bob Hays, and a long letter from Capt. J. J. Dawson a few days ago and it has whetted my curiosity a good deal. Do you need settlers? I think I would make a good settler, although I have never tried it. Is Bob Hays a man of truth and veracity? Would like to get some of his poetry in book form. According to Captain Dawson's weather reports there must be considerable rainfall in Tillamook. Maybe the Captain's rain gauge judges a little! Perhaps he lets it stand under the drip. He ought to take it inside once in awhile and regulate the weather. I was out in Nevada last week, and it is so dry there that they have to prime the rain gauge in order to get any rainfall at all. Can a man rely on what Dan Bowers says? I see he writes a good deal for your paper, and I was much interested in his Biology of the Low-necked Clam. Is he a real personage of flesh and bone, or is he a mere fiction? Has he been a governor, and of what? I sometimes doubt what he says. There are several items I want to know: are Charley Reynolds, C. B. Hadley and Karl P. Caudron representative citizens? I see they are councilmen, and maybe they could give me reliable information. You seem to have a great deal of trouble about transportation. Why don't somebody run a steamer from Tillamook to North Yamhill and save distance? Where is Nestucker and what is it? How did the name Tillamook originate, and how far is it from East Garibaldi? Is Theo. Steinliber the man who manufactures Limburger cheese? Can a man take up a good claim of government land on Hoquartion prairie, or on some clear land near Tillamook? I would prefer to get an abandoned claim, if it is a good one with a house and fences already on it. Can a man get anything on Jawbone? What chance would there be for a greenhorn who never had any experience to start a newspaper on Jawbone? I never tried running a paper, but think I know how to do it. I had a friend named Wilson who was a preacher and who ran a paper in Tillamook for awhile, what has become of him? I could preach a little myself if there should be an opening. Are there many in Tillamook who need reforming? Down here everybody is so full of prunes there is no use to talk religion to them. Some are full of grape juice also. What do you mean in

your paper when you say that several schooners went over the bar? Did you see them go over? How much did it cost? One item said that a schooner was seen outside the Nehalem bar. Who got outside the schooner? Now, I'll tell you what kind of a man I am, and you can judge if you people want me as a citizen, providing, of course, that your answers to my questions are satisfactory. I am an inventor and discoverer by trade, and do a little mining on the side, though I may farm if I go to Tillamook. I discovered the Sierra Nevada mountains a short time ago. I run across away up on the backbone right in the lumber regions. It was an accident, however, as I was out prospecting. Mining depends a good deal on chance.
