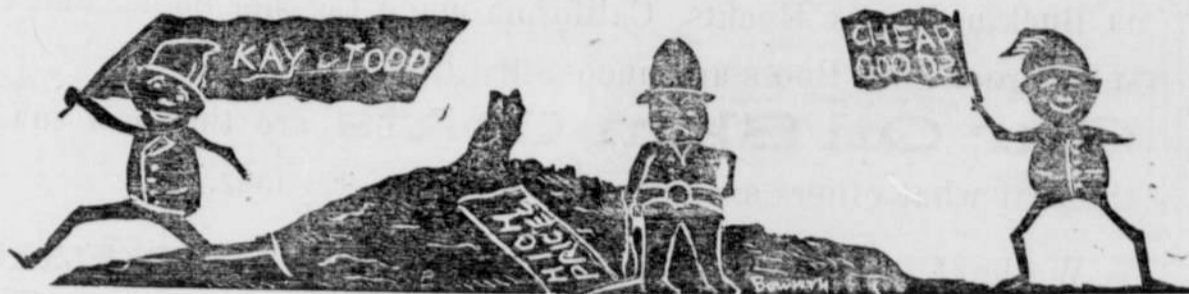

Assuming that Mr. Sooner really wants to know something, and that he is in the necessary state of vacuity and emptiness to gladly receive knowledge, I hasten to fill him up. I believe in the Bible, which says "Blessed are the empty for they shall get full."

Mr. Sooner asks, "Does Tillamook need settlers?" I think she do. She has enough people now, such as they are but there are too many who refuse to settle. I know of one man who has owed me \$10. for a year and he wont settle. But, Mr Sooner, if you have never settled, maybe your creditors wont let you come.

Mr Sooner asks, "Is Bob Hays a man of truth and veracity—Say pard, I have to give that word up. It is too high for my chunk, but I think he is. He is of the masculine gender, anyhow, and the father of an interesting family but, if you are after Bob's pedigree you might write to Doc Mills, at Nest-cow-in, who will fix Bob up all right."

"Can a man rely on what Dan Bowers says?" I hate to talk about myself, but I am forced to admit that the Hon. D. Bowers can be relied on to pay for anything that he can buy on tick.
