It is not at all certain that the steamer could turn around in our slough and as it would be worse than folly to put a boat on this route that can not come right up to our wharves, the Chilkat may not be put on this route at all.

The steamer was tied up to the wharf, and when the tide went out her keel rested on some obstruction and she listed enough to take in some water. The damage, however, was very slight.
