Mr. Severance's Address

The following brief address was delivered over the remains of the late R. R. Hays, by his friend A. W. Severance Esq. Friends and Fellow Citizens:

In the presence of the two great mysteries—life and death we have assembled to offer this proof of our affection and friendship to the memory of our departed friend.

On an occasion of this kind, we are made more sensible than ever of our frailties, and they bring from our hearts words of self-reproach, where we have been negligent of our duties, or failed to give to our departed friend the things that were of right his.

What we can say of our deceased friend, must be confined to his actions, his character, his aims and hopes in life.

Robert R. Hays was born June 3rd, 1856, in McLean County, Illinois; was united in marriage with Miss E. Ross, Dec. 31, 1883. Four children are the fruits which have blessed this happy union.

Because of the straightened circumstances of his parents, Mr. Hays' education was confined to the public schools, yet, nothing daunted, through his own efforts he thoroughly fitted himself for the duties of a stirring life.

His ability, honesty and integrity as a man won the confidence and esteem of his fellow man, and positions of honor and trust were accepted and filled by him to the complete satisfaction of his employes. He was the recipient of many public favors, and no higher praise could have been given him, than the universal verdict—"No one could have done better."

The most pleasing feature of the public favors given him, is that they were won alone by himself. No strong political influences presented and urged his claims. No sordid influence of wealth hounded the better instincts of nature.

They were won by his honesty, his integrity, his personal magnetism. They were won in such a manner, as to claim our approval and approbation.

Much may be accomplished in a life as brief as that of our deceased friend, and much has been accomplished by him; but personal friends and admirers know, that what he had accomplished was but the experience which had thoroughly armed and equipped him for higher aims, and a broader sphere of action.

Already his name was being associated with one of the most exalted positions of trust, in our state. He was a man intensely loyal to his country; proud of its institutions, and hoping for its highest and best welfare.

His domestic relations were of a pleasing and felicitous nature. He was a man intensely loyal to his country; proud of its institutions, and hoping for its highest and best welfare.

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man, he detested deceit and sham. His judgment of man and affairs was ever the result of being a close student of mankind and a careful observer of current events.

This man was our fellow citizen, our neighbor, and our friend.

Such a character is worthy of emulation. To the dependent and bereaved ones let us place ourselves in their stead and say for them, "As we take up the broken threads of life, let us carefully look into our hearts, examine his incomplete aims and objects, and so far as in our power endeavor to carry them out as he would have done had he been spared to us thereby enriching our own lives and keeping fresh and sacred his memory."

My friends I will detain you no longer by this faint and feeble tribute over the dead.

Even in other hands, adequate justice could not be performed within the limits of the occasion.

His highest, and best praise is your deep conviction, of his merits as a man, a son, a husband, and father, your affectionate gratitude for his labors.

It is not my voice, it is this cessation of ordinary pursuits, the arresting of all attention to business and pleasure, the dropping flags these solemn ceremonies and this crowded house which speaks his eulogy.

His name is safe. That is, now treasured beyond the reach of accident.

Tearfully, yet with fond recollections, let us bear our friend to his final resting place, and exhalted manhood reverencing his memory we will worship at the shrine of honored and exalted manhood.
