TILLAMOOK COUNTY

A REGION OF WONDERFUL FERTILITY.

Brief Description of Its Climate Resources etc.

Tillamook County is at the same time one of the least known and one of the best of all the comparatively new counties of the great State of Oregon.

The soil of Tillamook is unequalled for richness and depth. The prairies are of comparatively small area, but are excellent for grass. The rich bottom lands are however far richer and will produce any kind of crop desired.

Its magnificent forests of spruce, fir, larch, cedar and hemlock have been scarcely touched by the woodman's axe, and aside from the comparatively small amount of lumber shipped by the Nehalem mills and the Truckee Lumber Company at Hobsonville, only enough lumber has been saved for home consumption.

Fishing is carried on extensively and there are large canneries located at different points in the county. Nehalem has two, Tillamook has one, Woods and the Silette River have one cannery each.

Aside from these principal industries there are others that will in time develop into considerable importance. Fruits, especially apples, pears, plums, prunes and all the varieties of berries, especially the latter, grow in the greatest abundance and with proper cultivation bring a never failing crop.

Cranberry culture in certain sections of the county has been commenced on a large scale and bids fair to yield handsome returns.

and salalberries grow in great abundance. One of the new industries of this county that promises to develop into large proportions is the keeping of bees. The myriads of wild flowers that grow here furnish rich foraging ground for bees and the honey is noted for being of unusually fine flavor and clearness.

POPULATION. The population of Tillamook County is mostly a rural population. It is estimated that it amounts to about Five Thousand, of which about two thirds is in the rural districts.

TOWNS.—Tillamook City, the county seat, has a population of about 1000. It has all the business houses usual to a town of its size most of which carry large stocks of goods.

TRANSPORTATION AND ROADS. The public roads of Tillamook are said to be the best of any in the entire state. They were built at great expense and are being pushed forward as rapidly as needed.

Take it all in all there are few of the sections of our great country that offer the inducements to settlers that this county does and any man with sufficient means to buy a small ranch and stock can do well here.
