THE LIAR'S CLUB

The Liars Club was entertained last Monday evening at Liars Temple by the Ancient and Honorable Order of Busted Loggers.

It was an occasion long to be remembered on account of the sweet fellowship between loggers and liars, and the quantity of grub consumed.

The loggers arrived in all the elegance of slicker helmet, bicycle shirts and swallow tailed overalls, quite early, via the Bull-back & Mud-sled Line, now operated by Danrough and company, and after having submitted to a dentist in the hall-way to have the "curks" extracted from their booties they passed at once in the elegant hall decorated with bull hides and gracefully hung with lullulons of 'tailholds' ropes 'crash-hauls,' 'crotchlogs' and 'logchairs.' When each logger had been fed on a liberal allowance of every article on the bill of fare, irrigation and fumigation were declared in order, and the following toasts were called and responded to:

'The Loggers as He Was, Is and Will Be,' responded to by Ex Governor Bowers.

When the Ex Governor rose to speak he requested, Frank Severance, who was sitting opposite to him, to please turn up his coat collar and button up his coat as Frank's 40 carot diamond pin dazzled the Governors eyes so he couldn't

think. Frank was too full to button up his coat, but he put a potatoe skin on the diam and an Bowers proceeded:

'Mr Chairman, Gentleman, Loggers and O theers:

Bowers said that it was hard to say what the original logger was but if the Darwinian theory was correct he was probably a tumble-bug as he is always rolling something. What the loggers have made it known to all the earth, but every one who has lived in the woods has heard it. Bowers thought the logger would develop into a little pink and white angel and sit on a little damp hill or stump in glory and play celestial music with a chumby and a this feeling speech. Jerry Murphy and Clyde Clements went copious tears which were caught in a finger bowl and preserved as souvenirs of the occasion.

The second toast was:

'The Bar and the Schooners that Pass over It,' responded to by Clyde Clements.

The toast 'The Timber Scale' was responded to by Wm. Johnson. He said there were four kinds of scales Fairbanks scales, salmon scales, musical scales and timber scales. He said the timber scale was a kind of a bog which was not much used to any extent and that reduced the size of logs by 'eating of 'em up.' He favored a bath which he thought would destroy them. Some of the members took offense at the mention of a bath and threw a camp flap-jack at him which quelled all his ardor.

Frank Severance sang a song, entitled 'Way Down on the Miami,' which produced such a copious shower of tears,

The toast 'The Cook' was to have been responded to by Bell Johnson, but he was so drunk that he never made any toast. He said something about the captain of all the cooks having been eaten raw by the south sea cannibals, whereupon Jerry Murphy turned sick and asked whether it wasn't time for another schooner to cross the bar.

The three remaining toasts were hopelessly pried, by the chairman, in an effort to explain that a motion to adjourn couldn't be made in that order as there wasn't any one capable of making it. Closing his eyes to collect his thoughts he talked on for half an hour. When he opened his eyes, once more the room was empty.
