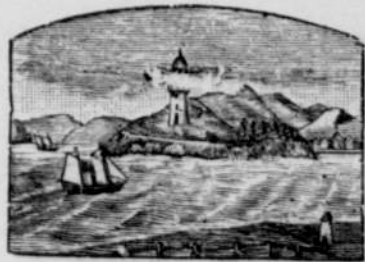

Nehalem
